Holy Week

You can find all the details about the remainder of Lent and also Holy Week in this issue of the *Dovetale*. Here I just want to emphasize the importance of Holy Week in particular.

Holy Week was the nucleus of the entire Christian year. First there was East-

er. Then Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the rest of Holy Week, beginning with Palm Sunday. Next came Lent as a season of preparation for Holy Week. Finally the rest of the Christian year was filled in. The entire Christian year matters. But Holy Week was the start of it all.

Part of the work of Holy Week is properly done at home. Try to take a little extra time for prayer that week. Reflect on your life with God, where you stand now and where you would like to be. Ask God's help in taking another step forward on your Christian journey.

Some of that work is best done with each other. We offer a lot of options at Saint David's, and we co-sponsor events at other area Churches as well. Gathering with brothers and sisters in Christ is important.

I encourage you to make a particular effort to attend the **three services at the core of Holy Week**: *Maundy Thursday*; *Good Friday*; and *Easter*

Sunday. Those three services encapsulate in miniature the entire gospel story. We hear the story of the first time Christians gathered around the table to celebrate the Eucharist. We hear again the awful events of Christ's death.

Finally, we hear the good news of great joy that Christ has risen, that Christ is alive, that Christ has defeated sin and death, and opened the way for us to experience eternal life.

On that first Easter morning, everything changed. This Easter will not be so dramatic as that very first one. But we will worship with great joy. We will drop the confession of sin, and bring back the alleluias. Afterwards we can indulge ourselves for the day—guilt-free!—in whatever we have given up for Lent.

Do your best to be part of the celebration. Bring family and friends with you. But also do the work of preparation in the remaining weeks leading up to that day. It will be worth it!!

Ecumenical Holy Week Services

Every year, the Agawam Clergy Association sponsors ecumenical services at noon each weekday during Holy Week, followed by a simple meal. This year the services will at Agawam Congregational on Main Street. Please join us any or all of April 15 to April 19 for worship and fellowship with our brothers and sisters from other denominations!

Holy Week Summary

On Palm Sunday (April 14), we'll have regular services at 8:00 and 10:00, except that they will begin with the procession of Palms. Each weekday during Holy Week, the Agawam Clergy Association sponsors a short ecumenical service at 12:00, followed by lunch at Agawam Congregational on Main Street. Our Maundy Thursday service will be April 18 at 7:00. Our principle Good Friday service will be April 19 at 7:00. But Good Friday is a big day. We start with a combined children's Stations of the Cross/Easter Egg Hunt from 10:00 to 12:00, and we will have a less formal Good Friday service in place of our regular healing Eucharist at 12. Finally, at 6:30, to get ready for our principal service, we'll walk the Stations of the Cross. On Holy Saturday (4/20), we'll have our usual prayer vigil from 10:00 to 4:00. That evening we will join several area Churches in an Easter Vigil at Saint Andrew's. And, of course, our Easter services on April 21 at 8:00 and 10:00. Whew!!

Stations of the Cross

As in past years, we offer Stations of the Cross at 11:30 every Friday during Lent. In April, that means on the 5th and the 12th. On Good Friday (April 19), we will walk the Stations at 6:30. This short, powerful service is a great way to keep focused on the meaning of Lent and Jesus' sacrifice for us. Please join us at 11:30. Stick around for the Eucharist which immediately follows and/or the Bible Study at 1:00!

Holy Saturday Prayer Vigil

As we have done for the last several years, we will have a prayer vigil in the Community Room on Holy Saturday (4/20) from 10:00 to 4:00. I invite you to sign up for thirty-minute slots. I will provide a set of readings and prayers, based on the service of Tenebrae, that you can use. But you could also sit quietly or pray in other ways. My own goal for my slot is to take a few minutes to reflect deeply on what Christ suffered for me as a way of finishing off Lent. Then I am more ready for the joyful celebration of Easter.

Easter Vigil

Once again we are teaming up with Saint Andrew's and other area Churches (Episcopal and UCC) for an Easter Vigil at 8:00 on Saturday, April 20. The Vigil is a traditional service beginning after dusk on the eve of Easter. Plans may change, but we normally begin outside and march around the Church, pausing for readings and songs at various points. We renew our baptismal covenant and celebrate Eucharist. After the service, we have a festive reception with sweets! Please let me know if you would like to participate.

Easter Flowers

Most weeks, the flowers and/or the altar candles are given to the glory of God and in honor of someone important to us. But in Easter we really do it up! If you would like to remember, honor, or give thanks for someone on Easter, please complete the special form (available in the narthex), attach a check for the relevant amount, and return it to the office or put it in the collection plate. Thanks!

Revival Worship Days

The Episcopal Churches in our area are trying to do more to cooperate. To that end, we have planned two events. On Thursday, May 23 at 7 PM at Grace Lutheran in West Springfield we will have a Jazz Vespers. The idea is to get people from our Churches together and also to bring in people who might not ordinarily attend Church. Then on Sunday, June 16 at 4:00PM Churches in our area will come together at the Cathedral for a joint worship service. Good times will be had by all!


Flooring Update

Senior Farm Shares for Lent

Community Involved in Sustaining Agriculture (CISA) has supported local farms for many years, in part by encouraging consumers to buy food directly from farmers through programs like farm shares. People with farm shares pay a certain amount of money to a farmer up front, and then receive vegetables or other farm products every week or so for a season. Recently CISA began subsidizing farm shares for needy seniors, and they are asking Churches for help. One share costs \$125.

Every year for Lent I give up some foods. Last year and this year, I am also aiming for a "complaint-free" Lent. I plan to donate the money I save on food, and the money I pay when I complain, to the senior farm share program. If others do the same and we pool our donation, I am sure we can support at least one farm share. You can also donate directly to CISA, of course. "Sustaining Earth, Our Island Home"

Lent is a time for us to be more reflective about how we live. That makes Lent an excellent time to think about our role in creation care. Our Diocese is part of a Pilot Program called "Sustaining Earth, Our Island Home," which should be rolled out some time in April. The idea is to answer a few questions on a web-based app which will help you to evaluate your carbon footprint and offer suggestions about easy ways to reduce it and save money at the same time. We'll provide more information as it becomes available. Together we really can make a difference!

Church without Walls

Life was complicated on March 10! First, we set our clocks forward an hour that night, which cuts down on sleep for those who remember and introduces chaos into the day for those who don't. Making matters worse, it snowed! We carried on with Church without walls and had a better showing than I expected. Our Gospel reading was the story of Jesus' temptation in the wilderness. As you might guess, the issue of temptation and how to resist it is one that everyone can relate to! Afterwards we distributed lunches to everyone as always. As it happens, our parish theme for that week was "Go," meaning going out into the world as agents of reconciliation. Church without walls is one of the ways we at Saint David's do just that. Thanks to everyone who makes this ministry possible!

Priest Sabbatical

Plans are moving forward for my three-month sabbatical next summer. Sabbaticals give priests a chance to rest, to engage in projects they could not otherwise complete, and to connect with God in a more intentional and intensive way than is normally possible during ordinary parish ministry. My application identified three goals: (1) paddle the northern half of the Connecticut River as a kind of two-week retreat; (2) complete a book on the Apostle Paul that I started several years ago; and (3) think with Bishop Scruton about new ministry goals for Saint David's. I will be gone from May 20 until August 18.

We are blessed to have retired priests in our parish who have agreed to cover most of the Sundays I am away. We'll also have a few lay-led services of Morning Prayer. I am profoundly grateful to everyone for filling in, and to the vestry for their support!

Contemplative Prayer and Lectio Divina

Our practice is to have a session of Contemplative Payer at 11:45 on the first Sunday of the month. In April, that is the 7th. Since our Lent formation program meets at the same time, we are combining the two that day. First we'll talk about prayer as part of "The Way of Love." Then we'll do an abbreviated version of Contemplative Prayer. Please join us!!



Why Statements

The focus at Parish Leadership Day this year was stewardship broadly understood. ("Stewardship is everything that comes after 'I believe"!) Our presenters invited us to think about why we do what we do. In stewardship, that means why we give our time, talent, and/or treasure to the Church. More generally, that means why we cultivate our relationships with God individually and as a parish. We'd love to have a few people share their thoughts on Sunday mornings and/or in writing. Parish Bible Study

We are now working our way through Exodus, the second book of the Bible. It tells the story of the escape of the Hebrew people from slavery in Egypt, as well as the first part of their wandering in the desert. About half-way through the book, the Hebrews arrive at Mount Sinai, where God gives them the law through Moses. This story is as central to the Old Testament as the Gospel story is to the New. Please join us on Fridays at 1:00. We always have a good time. And after Lent, we will probably once again have yummy treats!

Prayer Cycles

Two prayer cycles are available in the narthex near the mail slots: the nations of the world; and the people and ministries of Saint David's. (If you notice people or ministries missing from our Parish Prayer Cycle, please let me know!) I use both, and they have become a wonderful part of my prayer life. It takes just a few minutes each day, and over the course of a month, I pray by name for every nation in the world, and every member and ministry here at Saint David's. I encourage you to give it a try. We can all use more prayers on our behalf!!!! Fr. Harvey

Our parish is reading the New Testament this year. To make it through to the end, we need to read just one chapter each weekday. To encourage broad participation, I am including the specific chapters for each week in my weekly e-mails, as well as a link to helpful introductory videos for each book. I hope as many of you as possible will join in this effort!!

As a supplement to our readings, some of us gather each month to chat. Those conversations are quite informal—we just talk about whatever has struck us in the books we have recently finished. In April, we will gather on Tuesday, the 9th at 2:00. Please help spread the word. And get reading!!



Healing Eucharist Fridays at 12 except for April 19

We continue to offer our healing service on Fridays at 12:00. The only exception in April will be Good Friday, April 19, when we will have a Good Friday service instead. On the regular Friday services, we hear the assigned readings for the day, have an informal, conversational sermon about the saint assigned for the day, and share Eucharist. In addition, participants can receive special healing prayers and an anointing with holy oil. After the service, stick around for Bible Study if you like. Please join us, and help spread the word!
