MISSION STATEMENT:

As disciples of Jesus Christ, we are called to love and serve God and community, committing ourselves to lives of joyful worship, prayer, and the teaching of Scripture.

COVID THOUGHTS, ONE LAST TIME:

As I write this, I have heard rumblings of yet another COVID variant that poses yet another kind of risk. Like most of you, I suspect, my heart sank. All of us are tired of worrying about COVID!! I'm hoping this will be the last time I write about it in the Dovetale!!

It seems like COVID is not going away, and new variants will continue to emerge. But at Saint David's, we have about decided to stay the course, no matter what happens with COVID. A couple of the changes we made in our service are more or less permanent at this point. We'll continue to leave the collection plate by the entrance to the Church rather than passing it. We'll continue to "peace in place." Deacon Terry and I will continue to wear masks while we distribute communion. We'll continue to put a drop of wine on the communion wafers.

But we are not likely to return to some of the safeguards we took in the past. We are VERY unlikely to close our building. The Bishop has announced that he will leave future decisions about closures to local parishes, and we are not inclined to go that route. We will continue to sing, and to offer the chalice to those who want it.

If pandemic numbers go up and you are concerned about your safety, please talk to me. But here is the good news, even in the event the pandemic numbers get troubling. There is almost always space in the front pews where maintaining social distance is easy. It may seem un-Episcopalian to sit in the front row, but it could be kind of nice. Among other things, you could see and hear better! Another option is to watch part of the 10:00 service on the big screen in the community room, and then join us for Communion.

My point is, we want to do everything we can to help people feel safe. And we want to continue with our worship and community life with as few disruptions as possible.

So, absent some really dramatic outbreak, this really may be the last time you hear from me about COVID. We know what to do. We know how to stay safe. And we know how to keep going. That's our plan!!

Joining us or praying Morning Prayer or Compline on your own is a great way to add a little prayer into your weekly routine!

A YEAR WITH LUKE

A group of us meet on Zoom on Tuesdays at 4:15 roughly every other week to talk about a chapter of Luke's Gospel, along with a very accessible guide by N.T. Wright called *Luke for Everyone*. Our August meetings are tentatively scheduled for the 9th and the 23rd. Please join us!

PRISON BIBLE STUDY, by Fr. Harvey

We're trying again! Just before the pandemic first hit, we had set up a weekly Bible Study at the Women's Correctional Center in Chicopee. Before we had even a single session, the prison shut it down, along with all other volunteer efforts. Now that the prison is once again welcoming volunteers, we can resume this ministry.

The folks at the prison suggested we meet on Mondays from 7:00 to 8:00 in the evening. We will take one Monday a month—I've proposed the 4th Mondays—and other Churches/people will cover the remaining weeks. So far, we have three partners, although I am hoping to find a few more.

My goal is to get everything in place so that we can begin on Monday, September 11. If we make it, and if Saint David's gets the fourth Monday, our first session would be Monday, September 26.

Please let me know if you are interested in participating. If you would like to join me for the study sessions themselves, you need to be approved by the folks at the prison. I can talk you through the process, but for now I'll just say it takes some time. Unfortunately, it looks like those of us who already went through this process will have to do it again. I'll confirm that before signing up for the training!

FRIDAY NOONTIME HEALING EUCHARIST

A small group of us gather on Fridays at noon for a short healing service. The service includes a conversational sermon on the saint of the day, an opportunity for people who so choose to receive anointing and special prayers at the altar, and Holy Eucharist. It's a wonderfully intimate service. In August, we'll meet every Friday except the first—August 5. All are welcome—please help spread the word!

FRIDAY BIBLE STUDY AT 1:00

Our Friday Bible Study meets at 1:00 on Fridays. In August, we'll meet every Friday except the first—August 5. Many of us gather in person in the Community Room, while a few others join us by Zoom. We are still working our way through the Gospel of John. All are welcome, and you don't have to have any background knowledge about the Bible—just an interest in learning! Please join us!

CONTEMPLATIVE PRAYER ON FRIDAYS AT 2:30

We gather Fridays at 2:30 for a session of contemplative prayer. We read a passage of Scripture three times, interspersed with short periods of silence. The basic question we ask ourselves is, what is God saying to me through this passage? In August, we'll meet every Friday except the first—August 5. Our sessions are hybrid: some of us gather in person while others join us on Zoom. Please join us in whatever way is most comfortable for you!

CHURCH WITHOUT WALLS, by Fr. Harvey

On our Sunday to lead this service, I dashed around gathering the stuff at the last minute, as always. As I was walking out the door, someone double-checked, asking me if I had everything. I assured them I did. I should have looked—once again, I forgot the communion wafers! Thankfully Lorraine, one of the pillars of the Parish Cupboard, came to the rescue. This time we had cheese nips for communion. They were pretty tasty, so maybe it's something we should consider at Saint David's!

Despite my goofiness, we had a good service with several of our normal crew and one person new to me. And, to link our Sunday services that day with the service at Church without Walls, we blessed the lunches we provided our guests at the Cupboard on our altar at the 10:00 service.

In August, I'll be away for Church without Walls. Terry has agreed to lead the service, which means it's more likely to be done right this time!!

HEALING MINISTRY

We continue to offer prayers for healing each week at the altar after the 10:00 service. If you would like to receive prayers for yourself or for a loved one, please go to the altar after the service to meet the designated person offering prayers that week. EUCHARISTIC VISITS AND VISITORS

THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH ON ABORTION, by Fr. Harvey

This is a short summary of the material we covered at our July conversation about the position of the Church on abortion. It will not do justice to a difficult and controversial topic, on which we do not all agree!! But here goes. The Church begins with the premise that all life is sacred, from inception until death. But it also recognizes that life can be complicated and tragic. Terminating a pregnancy may never be a good option, but it is sometimes the best option, most obviously if the life of the mother is at risk, but in some other circumstances as well. Wisely the Church has refrained from specifying exactly when abortion might be appropriate and when it would not be. Instead, the Church encourages women to make their own decisions, in consultation with their doctors and in prayer. Our task as Church is to equip our people to make moral choices in exactly those kinds of difficult circumstances. If you have questions about this position or would like to talk more about it, please let me know.

DROP IN CENTER FROM: Linda Taupier

The Drop-In Center at the Episcopal Cathedral in Springfield is always looking for folks who might come and simply be present with our guests, sit and talk over a cup of coffee. We are open Thursday from 9 - 1, and the setup is at 8:40. Many of our volunteers come every week, but that is not necessary. Creation Care: By Pauline Mortenson

Firstly, I would like to share some amazing information I just received about a tasty treat or just a slimy shellfish - the oyster. They create oyster reefs by growing in crusty clumps and are sometimes considered the unsung hero of the marine world. They are powerful filter feeders with just a single oyster cleaning 50 gallons of water every day - that's like a bathtub filled to the brim. They can remove large amounts of excess nutrients and other pollutants from coastal waters. If anyone has shelled oysters, then you know how hard the shells are and can really cut-up your hands until you get the knack of it (which I never got the knack of doing). These hard shells provide a natural barrier against rising sea tides and protect shorelines from erosion.

But...and unfortunately in these times we always have a "but" - oyster reefs are the most imperiled marine habitat on Earth. Globally, over 85% of oyster reefs have disappeared due to pollution, overfishing and habitat degradation. Ok - they may not be the cutest creature in the animal kingdom, but they are a vital part of the ecosystem. Secondly, if you would like to support Monarch Butterflies, consider planting several kinds of pesticide-free native milkweed that flower at different times. For free seeds, go to saveourmonarchs.org and enjoy the Monarchs enjoying the milkweed.
