A HOLY ADVENT

Please consider this an invitation to a holy Lent.

Advent, and the new Christian year, began on Sunday, November 27. Inside this issue of the *Dovetale*, you will find lots of ways you can observe the new season, both at Church and at home. I hope you will take advantage of many of them.

We will experience these weeks differently. Many of us will be busy with family and friends. Others of us may find this a difficult time as they struggle with loneliness or grief. All of us will be besieged with advertising and other messages telling us how we should feel, and what we should be doing, and mostly where we should spend our money. That is the reality of the Christmas season in contemporary America.

But in this season, the Church invites us to spend time in prayer and self-reflection, in preparation and hopefulness, in gratitude and loving service. What specific Advent activities work for you doesn't matter so much. But I encourage everyone to spend some intentional time with God over the next four weeks. Advent is a holy season of preparation to welcome our Lord come Christmas, as well as to grow in our relationship with God in the coming year.

I also encourage everyone to let others know what you are doing to observe Advent. There is, I think, a spiritual hunger in contemporary America that only God can satisfy. But many people need a little encouragement to address that deepest need.

The Christmas season is a complicated time. But whatever else it is, it is also a time when people expect to hear about the Christ child, when people's attention turns to worship at least some of the time, when people pause to reflect on what matters most.

My prayer for us in this season is that our lives witness to what truly matters.

MORNING PRAYER

Joining us or praying Morning Prayer or Compline on your own is a great way to add a little prayer into your weekly routine!

HEALING MINISTRY

In the front row of chairs are baskets with small ribbons. If you would like special prayers at the altar during Communion at Sunday services, bring a ribbon with you. Fr. Harvey or Dcn. Terry will offer a quick prayer. Please return the ribbon afterwards!

We also offer prayers for healing after the 10:00 service. If you would like to receive prayers for yourself or for a loved one, please go to the altar after the service to meet the designated person offering prayers that week. If you would like to join the rotation of those who offer healing prayers, please let Fr. Harvey know. Thanks!!

NO WINE ON THE WAFERS, by Fr. Harvey

You may have noticed that we are no longer putting a drop of wine on communion wafers. That was a special pandemic accommodation since we were not able to share the common cup for so long. After we resumed offering the chalice, we wanted to continue putting wine on the wafer for some time for those who were not comfortable receiving wine from the chalice. We have now discontinued that practice since most of us do receive from the chalice. To those who prefer not to receive from the chalice, for whatever reason, please know that the Church has always taught that Communion is complete in either kind. You receive the full benefit of the sacrament from the wafer, whether or not you also receive wine.

CONTEMPLATIVE PRAYER ON FRIDAYS AT 2:30

We gather Fridays at 2:30 for a session of contemplative prayer. We read a passage of Scripture three times, interspersed with short periods of silence. The basic question we ask ourselves is, what is God saying to me through this passage. Our sessions are hybrid: some of us gather in person, while others join us on Zoom. Please join us in whatever way is most comfortable for you!

THE JOHN O'HARE VETERAN'S MINISTRY, by Fr. Harvey

CHURCH RENTALS, by Fr. Harvey

Rentals are a bigger and bigger part of our budget, as well as our parish life. Anyone who has been to Church recently will have noticed musical instruments along the wall of the sanctuary. If you look more closely, you can see that our storage room is full, and that there is a lot of action in the kitchen. All that action can be a pain. But it is also a REALLY good thing for us.

Renting space has become a critical part of our budget. Pledges and fundraisers have not fully covered our expenses for years. Our expenses continue to go up, and to go up faster than pledge income. Realistically, we need to increase our rental income every year if we want to maintain balanced budgets.

So, if you find yourself inconvenienced by one of our tenants, if for example you want space at a time when the space is taken, please take a minute to remember that we rely on our tenants to fund our own mission, and be as patient as you can. Thanks!

BIG BLUE DROP-IN CENTER (at Christ Church Cathedral)

The Big Blue Drop-In Center located in the undercroft of Christ Church Cathedral is once again looking for donations of gently used winter wear. We have seen a dramatic increase in the number of people who visit the Drop-In Center on Thursdays and are near 50 consistently each week. Many of our guests are homeless and in need of all types of clothing. A few weeks back we had a family of 10 come in after getting lunch at Loaves and Fishes. We had no clothing we could give to the mom. We had some shirts in the dad's size which he appreciated. We are especially low on larger size, men's clothing/coats.

If you go through your closets and drawers and find items to donate, please drop them off. Please call the Cathedral first to schedule a time when someone will be there. 413 736-2742. We can use sweatpants and hoodies as well as coats, boots, gloves and other items needed for life on the streets.

BOUNDARY DISPUTE, by Fr. Harvey

I want to let everyone know about an unfortunate situation. The neighbor behind the Police Station and abutting our retaining pond has been pushing into our property, most recently with a new fence. We stated our position that his fence was on our land. He and his father, who lives next door, insisted that they owned the property right up to the fence. Finally, we had a survey done, which showed that father and son both have buildings on our land. They were still unwilling to negotiate.

The Diocese has now gotten involved, which is a great relief. The Diocese' lawyer has been in touch with both men, and he is prepared to take them to court if necessary. I am glad the Diocese is doing what needs to be done, and at no cost to us. In the meantime, our job is to pray for our neighbors and for the whole situation.

CREATION CARE KIDS' CORNER by Mary Moore

Let it snow! - How Snow, Sleet, Rain, & Freezing Rain Are Formed

Winter weather sometimes means snow, sleet, or freezing rain coming down. On occasion we might get plain rain. The difference between each is how they are formed.

<u>Snow</u> - Water vapor in the clouds freezes into individual ice crystals. One crystal is not heavy enough by itself to fall to the ground, but when they collide and stick to each other, they get bigger and bigger until finally snowflakes are formed. Snowflakes are heavy enough to fall to the ground.

<u>Sleet -</u> Sleet is made up of raindrops that freeze on their way down to the ground. Sleet is already frozen before it hits the ground.

Rain - Rain in the wintertime is from snowflakes that melt on their way down to earth. Some summer rain forms in the same way, from melted snowflakes, but it can also come from water droplets that never go through the snowflake state. Water droplets in the clouds bump into each other, making bigger water droplets. Eventually these droplets get too heavy and fall as rain.

<u>Freezing Rain</u> - This is simply rain that freezes as soon as soon as it hits the cold ground. <u>Activities:</u> Ask someone who drives a car which of these they like least to drive in, and why.

Make some paper snowflakes. If you don't know how, you can find directions online.

CREATION CARE CORNER, by Jim Shields / Pauline Mortenson

Living deep in the channels and sounds of the Arctic Ocean is an interesting whale called the narwhal whale. Why so interesting?? Well, they have up to a ten foot tusk which is long and pointy coming out of their heads. This tusk is actually a tooth which is the only tooth this narwhal whale has...unless...it has two tusks which some narwhals actually have. Usually males have the tusk according to field guides. But...some female narwhals also have a tusk. It is a sensitive organ which transmits pleasure. The tusk senses changes in pressure and temperature. Also, it accurately measures the levels of salt in the water. All this information is translated through a nerve that goes directly to the brain. This information transmitted by the tusk can change a narwhal's heart rate. Space-camera observers notice how narwhals seek areas of complex shoreline to avoid orcas. They are fascinating and sadly they must be impacted by the melting ice. According to the scientists watching them, these narwhals are changing their migration patterns to adapt to the melting ice. What a thrill though to actually see one and how sad to have our oceans changing on them.

CHRISTMAS SCHEDULE, by Fr. Harvey

We have a lot going on! A full schedule is posted in the narthex and included with my weekly email blasts, as well as listed on a single page at the end of this issue of the Dovetale. Here I'll be brief. I have organized events topically.

Worship: The first three of our Friday noon services of Holy Eucharist will have an Advent theme, although I'm not entirely sure what that will look like(!). The service on Friday December 23 will have a Blue Christmas theme. We are also joining with the Cathedral in their Blue Christmas Service of Evening Prayer, with Bishop Fisher as the preacher, on Sunday, December 18 at 5:00.

Our Christmas Pageant will happen during the 10:00 service on December 18. Our Christmas Eve service will be at 4:00. On Christmas Day, we'll have a single, quiet service at 9:00. And on January 1, we'll have Lessons and Carols at 10:00.

<u>Children:</u> Beginning on Sunday, November 27, our children will receive a Jesse Tree for use at home, along with instructions. This is a fun devotion that introduces children to some of the biblical heroes. Children will rehearse for the pageant during Sunday School, and have a final walk-through after Church on Sunday, December 11. As noted above, the pageant itself will happen at the 10:00 service on December 18. Thanks to everyone involved in making it happen! And of course Breakfast with Santa on Saturday, December 10 from 9:00-11:00.

Retreats: We've been invited to participate in two retreats. The first, on December 3 with Margaret Bullit Jonas is about finding comfort in hard times. It's on Zoom. I've done an online retreat with Margaret before, and it's really wonderful. Let me know if you need the registration information. The other is a Zentangle retreat on December 17 at the Church of the Atonement in Westfield. I'm a little fuzzy on what zentangle is. But here's what I am told: it's an art thing that is easy for people with no artistic talent.

<u>Outreach:</u> We continue with our usual outreach: the Veterans Lunch and Church without Walls. We also collect food for the Parish Cupboard and diapers for the Kahn family. You might consider giving "Gifts for Life" this year instead of regular gifts. That is when you donate things like a well or a flock of chicks to a needy family in honor of someone you love. You can give these gifts through organizations like Episcopal Relief and Development. We have several catalogs in the narthex.

The main thing we do as a Church is the Agawam Christmas Project. Jude and Sue O'Hare are coordinating it for us this year. As of this writing, they were still waiting on the town nurse to give them names and a deadline for the gifts. We'll get that information out as soon as it's available.

<u>Formation:</u> Here, too, we continue with our regular round of online Morning Prayer, Bible study, and similar offerings. We also have Advent devotionals in the narthex, as well as seasonal forms for saying Morning Prayer or Compline at home. We had an Advent-Wreath making session on the first Sunday of Advent (11/27). That's a great Advent home devotional practice.

The main Advent formation offering for the parish is the series "The Gifts of Advent" on Tuesdays from 6:30-7:30 on Zoom. Several Churches are teaming up for this series. Bishop Fisher will lead the first session. Other area priests lead the next two, and I'll lead the last one. The sessions are a series based on the Advent candles (hope, peace, joy, and love), but the sessions can also stand alone for those who can't make all four.
