MISSION STATEMENT:

As disciples of Jesus Christ, we are called to love and serve God and community, committing ourselves to lives of joyful worship, prayer, and the teaching of Scripture.

INVITATION TO A HOLY LENT:

This year, Lent begins on February 14 (aka Valentines Day!). To kick off the Lenten season, we'll have our traditional Ash Wednesday service at 5:30 pm. And at that service, I will invite you, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent.

Lent is one of the most important seasons of the Christian year. It is a time of preparation that gets us ready to acknowledge the brutal events of Holy Week, particularly Christ's death on the cross, and then to celebrate the incredibly good news of Easter, that Christ is raised.

Those events stand at the very heart of our faith. And yet they can become so familiar that they cease to shock and amaze us. We begin to take them for granted. Lent is the antidote for this attitude.

We will have many opportunities to gather during Lent. But important as gathering for worship is, Lent is largely a season that you observe at home.

One of the duties of Lent is self-examination and repentance. We pause to acknowledge the ways we have turned away from God, and to commit ourselves to turning back. The Ash Wednesday service is a good way to begin that process, but it should continue throughout the season.

A second duty is fasting and self-denial. What that means in practice will vary from person to person, but all of us should give something up or take something on. The point is not suffering for its own sake. The point is to act in such a way that our attention is drawn back to God. So, for example, I will once again give up sweets. Ideally, every time I crave sweets, I will pause to remember what Christ has done for me. Then, come Easter, I can eat sweets again, and generally celebrate God's abundance with renewed gratitude!

A third duty is reading and meditating on God's Holy Word. Join one of our Bible studies or contemplative prayer. Participate in our Lent formation program. Say Morning Prayer (a Lent form will be available in the narthex) or use one of our Lenten devotionals. Again, the point is to take some time to come to know God better.

If you take Lent seriously, if you strive to have a Holy Lent, you will not enjoy every minute of it. But you will grow a little closer to God. You will know a little more joy. You will experience a little bit of new life. And that is a very good reason to give it a try!!

LENT MADNESS:

Based loosely on the NCAA basketball tournament, this online devotion pits saints against one another in a bracket as voters choose their favorites throughout the penitential season of Lent. Here's how to participate: on the weekdays of Lent, beginning on February 15, information is posted at www.lentmadness.org about two different saints. Each pairing remains open for 24 hours as participants read about and then vote to determine which saint moves on to the next round. If you're looking for a Lenten discipline that is fun, educational, occasionally goofy, and always joyful, join the Lent Madness journey. Lent needn't be all doom and gloom. After all, what could be more joyful than a season specifically set aside to get closer to Jesus Christ?

LENT PRAYER PARTNERS:

Participants pray for their partner every day during Lent, and then send an Easter Card to their partner offering God's blessings on that person. This is a great way to support each other as a community of faith. If you would like to participate, please let Fr. Harvey know.

LENT FORMATION PROGRAM:

Our Lent formation program is based on the Stations of the Cross. During Lent, we walk the Stations every Friday, using the very attractive, hand-carved Stations we inherited from Saint Christopher's. On Sundays at 11:30, we'll gather to discuss two of the Stations. We'll look at the Biblical passage and prayer associated with each Station, as well an image of it. Then we'll discuss how it connects to our lives and what it can teach us about keeping a holy Lent. Please join us for any or all of the sessions!

COMPLAINT-FREE LENT:

This is another wonderful Lent option. The basic idea is to wear a purple bracelet that reminds us not to complain. Every time we do complain despite the reminder, we put aside a little money. At the end of Lent, we donate the collected money to a good cause. Those who have participated in past years will remember how helpful this practice can be. But I warn anyone who hasn't participated before: don't commit to putting aside much money for each complaint. It can really add up!! The purple bracelets are throughout Lent (while supplies last). Please join the "fun"!

Stations of the Cross

Beginning on Friday, February 16, we'll walk the Stations of the Cross every Friday at 11:15. The service takes about thirty minutes, and is a wonderful way to focus your Lenten journey. Please join us!

TUESDAY CONVERSATIONS: by Fr. Harvey

This ministry continues to go well. Deacon Terry and friends lead it on the first Mondays of the month. Penny Miller, Mary Moore, and I lead it on the fourth Mondays—the 26th this month. Other Churches and even a Jewish Cantor lead the sessions on the remaining Mondays.

We are not allowed to give gifts to the inmates, but please let me know if you can think of ways to involve people from the parish in this ministry. One possibility is sending cards or letters. If anyone is interested, I'll check with the prison administration to figure out how that could work. Thanks!

FRIDAY EVENTS: by Fr. Harvey

On Fridays we have a Healing Eucharist at noon, Bible Study at 1:00, and Contemplative Prayer at 2:30. All three are in person, but you can also join the last two by Zoom. All three will meet every Friday in February. Please join us!

WHY ST. DAVID'S

Why Statement covers 2 aspects - why the Episcopal Church, and why St. David's in particular, though the St. David's part actually came first. I was raised as Roman Catholic, but after some intense soul-searching, a deeply personal revelation made me leave that church more than 50 years ago. If I were a celebrity, I probably would have been excommunicated anyway. My faith in God never dwindled, but how I worshiped changed to a more solitary or small group kind. Since about 5 or 6 years ago though, I could feel God trying to draw me back into the church. I just wasn't sure which one exactly. That pull got even stronger during my husband's illness and after his death.

After my husband died, a friend, Jim Shields, invited me to come to a service here. Unfortunately it was right around the time of what would have been my 45th wedding anniversary and the whole visit turned out to be a disaster, with me leaving the service early, walking the labyrinth in the rain, and crying most of the way home. Thanks to Jim though, I was back here within a month to talk with Father Harvey about my grief. I was impressed by the fact that here was a priest willing to talk to me - me, not a member of his congregation, and so why would he care? But care he did! Our talk turned out to be one of the most important and productive conversations I have ever had in my life. We were talking about my soul here, after all.

After talking with Father Harvey, I started attending services at the Universalist Unitarian Church in Greenfield, about 8 miles from my house, but felt something was missing. I kept feeling drawn back to St. David's - 35 miles away - and started coming here more and more. The next thing I knew, I had become a permanent fixture. I thank you all for that. Never in my life have I seen a group of people living out their faith like you do. You are all so supportive and loving. So the St. David's part of my life is a direct consequence of all the good that I have experienced within these walls.

Now, why the Episcopal Church and not some other one? I think what sealed the deal to explore the Episcopal religion was the first time I received holy communion at St. David's. I had such a good feeling permeate the whole of my being that I was sure this was where I belonged. But those of you who know me well know that I do not take my faith lightly and I still had questions. Participating in Bible study, the healing services, and contemplative prayer helped answer some of those. What ultimately helped me become an Episcopalian though was attending the Episcopal Way sessions and the continuous spiritual guidance from Father Harvey. I was able to ask the hard questions and have discussions with him without being considered a heretic. And during one of our last classes when he discussed the similarities and differences among the various Christian religions, I knew this was indeed the right place for me.

So, grief brought me here. Kindness - yours - kept me here to investigate and meditate. And study, coupled with spiritual guidance, solidified my decision to become an Episcopalian. I thank God for the entirety of the path that led me to this place in my life. Thank you, Lord, for you hear our prayers! Mary Moore

Birds to look for in February!

February is chockfull of bird activity. At the beginning of the month, you might see or hear great horned owls. They are among the first birds to start building their nests in Western Massachusetts. Around the middle of the month, you might spot ducks coming back into the area from the south. You might also see killdeer in farmers' fields if there is no snow on the ground. Then towards the end of the month, you may see turkey vultures or flocks of grackles and red winged blackbirds, which are also coming back from the south. In addition to all these returning birds, you might hear cardinals and chickadees, two kinds of birds that stay here for the winter, but that are now singing their spring songs.

CREATION CARE: by Pauline Mortenson

Loggerhead Sea Turtles

You're a volunteer on a deserted beach on the island of Wasswa, a national wildlife refuge, which is 14 miles southeast of Savannah, Georgia. The island is only a three-mile-wide piece of land. It's a nearly moonless night in July around 9:30 p.m. We're looking for loggerhead sea turtles which are considered threatened worldwide. We're told to look for something like tire tracks. Then we see the tracks...three-foot-wide parallel grooves running up from the ocean. The sea turtle is on the sand dunes and is rhythmically moving her flippers, reaching one back flipper at a time below her and flicking a bit of sand away from the hole she's digging then will lay her eggs. The female returns to the ocean and about two months later baby sea turtles emerge from the nests and crawl to the sea. The hatchlings face 1,000 to 1 odds against surviving to adult. The females that do survive won't be back to the region for perhaps another 30 years. This is just the start of a week-long adventure in learning about loggerheads.
