Our Friday Bible Study meets at 1:00 on Fridays. In July, we'll meet every Friday except the last—July 29. Many of us gather in person in the Community Room, while others join us by Zoom. We are still working through the Gospel of John. All are welcome, and you don't have to have any background knowledge about the Bible—just an interest in learning! Please join us!

#### **CONTEMPLATIVE PRAYER ON FRIDAYS AT 2:30**

We gather Fridays at 2:30 for a session of contemplative prayer. We read a passage of Scripture three times, interspersed with short periods of silence. The basic question we ask ourselves is, what is God saying to me through this passage? In July, we'll meet every Friday except the last—July 29. Our sessions are hybrid: some of us gather in person while others join us on Zoom. Please join us in whatever way is most comfortable for you!

## **HEALING MINISTRY**

We continue to offer prayers for healing each week at the altar after the 10:00 service. If you would like to receive prayers for yourself or for a loved one, please go to the altar after the service to meet the designated person offering prayers that week. We are back to offering the chalice at our services of Holy Communion. You may intinct (dip) or sip. Those who prefer not to share the chalice still receive the full grace of the sacrament from the host alone, especially since it has a drop of consecrated wine on it.

## **OUR AFGHAN REFUGEE UPDATE**

All is well. Thanks to many of you!

The four oldest boys are attending Frank Freeman Elementary School in Springfield, including Rohullah, who has MS. This is Rohullah's first time attending school, and he is twelve years old. What a blessing for this young boy. They are all doing well in school, well behaved and they love school!

The little one, Sulliman, is only three, so he is staying home with mom.

Afzal (the dad) has started work at Lenox (American Saw), in East Longmeadow. He works 5pm to 5 am. He rides his bike from Springfield to work each day. It is tiresome, but a necessary evil for now. He is learning his English, so that he can get a learners permit and a license, so that he won't need to ride the bike. So far, so good with his job.

Sharifa, (the mom) is expecting a baby in September! Oh, my. She is doing well and is getting good medical attention. The doctors say that everything is going fine thus far. As time gets closer we may need to ask for diapers, as they are expensive and that maybe helpful. We have a lot of baby supplies, but may put out a call, should something we don't have be needed.

Both Afzal and Sharifa are attending English classes throughout the week, and they are making good progress.

The house is in good order, all the items donated are being used gratefully.

The boys will be attending summer school to assist them in "getting caught up" as well as attending soccer camp at Camp Weber in West Springfield this summer (fun time). This will help the kids interact and keep learning English.

Our team continues to support the family by providing rides, taking them shopping, fixing broken toys and helping around the house as needed. We also visit with them frequently to let them know that they are not alone.

So – all in all – they are doing well! Lots of moving parts.

It's an opportunity for us to "welcome the stranger, care for the poor", just like we are told to do.

## PRISON BIBLE STUDY: by Fr. Harvey

We're trying again! Just before the pandemic first hit, we had set up a weekly Bible Study at the Women's Correctional Center in Chicopee. Before we had even a single session, the prison shut it down, along with all other volunteer efforts. Now that the prison is once again welcoming volunteers, we can resume this ministry.

The folks at the prison suggested we meet on Mondays from 7:00 to 8:00 in the evening. We would take one Monday a month—I've proposed the 4<sup>th</sup> Mondays—and other Churches/people would cover the remaining weeks. So far, we have three partners, although I am hoping to find a few more.

My goal is to get everything in place so that we can begin on Monday, September 11. If we make it, and if we get the fourth Monday, our first session would be Monday, September 26.

Please let me know if you are interested in participating. If you would like to join me for the study sessions themselves, you need to be approved by the folks at the prison. I can talk you through the process, but for now I'll just say it takes some time. Unfortunately, it looks like those of us who already went through this process will have to do it again. I'll confirm that before signing up for the training!

# **GRIEF GROUP**

Our St. David's Grief Group is established to help anyone coping with loss, and that would be the loss of not only a loved one, but any loss, your job, your pet, retirement; we all grieve many things at various times in our lives. Many of us that attend are at different stages of grief, and we all are there to help make the process of grief less difficult to experience. Grief affects all of in different ways. # **APPALACHIAN TRAIL MAGIC:** by Fr. Harvey

An Episcopal Church in the Berkshires offers "trail magic" to hikers passing through on the Appalachian Trail. That means things like hot dogs and soda, or else a free charge for hikers' cell phones. As a former Appalachian Trail hiker, I was the occasional recipient of such trail magic, and I can testify that it is a really wonderful thing. I'm thinking a group of us should head out there one day to take a turn. The food, drink, and chargers are all provided. Our role would be to welcome hikers and offer them the stuff. # **CREATION CARE CORNER**, Jim Shields:

A recent article in Time, "A Truth As Cold As Ice", laid out the problems climate change is bringing to the Artic and Antarctic regions. Here are some salient points:

- 1. Antarctica saw its hottest temperature on 2/6/2020, 70 degrees F. At the other end of the world, an Artic Siberian city reached a record high of 100.4 degrees on 6/20/2020. Precipitous declines in sea ice accompanied these rising temperatures at both poles.
- 2. Most Chinstrap Penguin colonies in Antarctica have steadily declined over the past 50 years, some by half and others by as much as 77%.
- 3. Almost every marine animal eats either krill (like Chinstraps) or something else that eats krill. As global temperatures rise because of increased carbon emissions, sea ice is declining, which decreases krill populations that feed off the algae and phytoplankton that cling to the underside of the sea ice. This is an alarming impact on the ocean's food chain.
- 4. The shrinking sea ice exposes vulnerable shorelines to rapid erosion and forces indigenous villages to relocate inland, and has disrupted the hunting of seal, polar bears, and walruses so vital to their way of life.
- 5. If temperatures keep rising in the Arctic, there is a potential that the permafrost, the permanently frozen ground, could begin to thaw, which would release greenhouse gases and further warm the poles. This is a carbon time bomb waiting to go off.
- 6. At the South Pole, the permafrost is covered by Antarctic ice sheet. If that melts away, it is projected that there could be a 200 foot rise in sea level.

Fwd: Huli huli Chicken

3 or 4 lbs boneless chicken.
