People have been flexible about where they sit, faithful in wearing masks and maintaining social distance as much as possible, and cooperative in adjusting to new ways of worshipping. As a result, we have been able to worship together in a safe way. I am grateful to everyone for making this work, with a special shout-out to Jim Shields and his crew of ushers for their role in helping that to happen!

I look forward to the day when we can relax our precautions. But until that day comes, it is important that we remain cautious so that people who have not been able to get vaccinated, for whatever reason, can still feel comfortable worshipping with us. I say again, thanks to everyone for your cooperation.

For the foreseeable future, and maybe forever, most of our weekday events will be hybrids. That means some of us will gather in person, while others participate on Zoom. It will be interesting to see how all that shakes out. I could imagine, for example, that the Men's Bible Study might stay on Zoom. Our Friday Healing Eucharist is only in-person. But our Friday Bible Study, Contemplative Prayer, and Vestry will all likely be both. If you are ever unsure about whether an event in online, in-person, or both, contact me or the Church office.

As things begin to open up, we have also been able to resume a few of the ministries we had to put on hold. At the moment, I am thinking primarily about our Veterans lunches. But it is also time to work on our gardens, including expanding our vegetable garden with the help of a \$2000 grant we received from the Diocese. I am hoping we will also be able to resume our Church without Walls in West Springfield. But with Martha retiring and the Parish Cupboard having relocated, this is another one we'll have to see about.

All that is to say, I can feel new life in our parish family. And that new life is a lot like the plant life around us. Some things are already blossoming. Others have just poked through the surface. Others haven't yet quite sprouted. But the Holy Spirit is swirling around, Christ is with us, and good things are happening. Thanks be to God! Alleluia, alleluia!!

Communion During a Pandemic

Our building is now open, and we have resumed our Sunday services at 8:00 and 10:00, with Eucharist available to everyone who is there. But we still want to make holy communion available to people who cannot be present. You can pick up consecrated wafers, with a drop of consecrated wine on the wafer, on Fridays between 11:00 and 3:00 for consumption while watching the livestream of the service. We'll also include the prayer for spiritual communion as part of the livestream for people who are not able to pick up a wafer. Finally, we can bring communion to you. If you would like us to do that, please be in touch with Fr. Harvey and he'll set it up.

Daily Prayer

We (Saint David's) continue to offer Morning Prayer every weekday at 8:00. Deacon Terry leads it on Mondays and Fridays, and Father Harvey leads it on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Saint Mark's offers Compline or something similar at 8:00 every weekday evening except Wednesdays. Please take advantage of these services as you are able. And please spread the word!

Friday Healing Eucharist

Our Friday Healing Eucharists are back! We gather for the service in person in the Sunday School Room at noon, following the same precautions we observed last fall. Mostly that means masks, social distancing, and no anointing. I'm thrilled to be able to gather once again!

Friday Bible Study at 1:00

The Friday Bible Study is getting fancy! Several of us are now meeting in person in the Community Room. With snacks! Others join us by Zoom. We continue to hone our ability to host this kind of hybrid meeting, but we are getting better. We now have a mounted screen in the Community Room, which allows everyone physically present to see people on Zoom. Thanks to a special camera and microphone, people on Zoom should be able to hear and see better as well. We continue to work through Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, which turns out to be remarkably relevant to us today. Please join us in person or on Zoom! And spread the word!

Contemplative Prayer and Lectio Divina

"Lectio Divina" is a prayerful reading of a Bible passage, interspersed with short periods of silence. The basic question we ask ourselves is, what is God saying to me through this passage? We continue to offer contemplative prayer on Fridays at 2:30 and, like so much else, we now meet both in person and on Zoom. Please join us!

In some ways, the delay may have been a blessing because the Diocese has now joined a denomination-wide program called Good News Gardens. The goal of that program is essentially what we hoped to do with our garden: involve people of all ages in growing food that we can both enjoy and share. Now we are part of a cohort of Churches working along the same basic lines. CREATION CARE

INSECTS by Mary Moore

Most of the animals that we call bugs are insects. About 75% (three quarters) of all the animals alive are insects! Scientists have been able to identify over 1 million different species, or types, of insects.

Insects hatch from eggs as wormy looking things called larvae, for example, caterpillars. As these baby insects grow into adults, their whole body changes. Think of the difference between a caterpillar (the baby stage) and a butterfly (the adult stage). Adult insects have three main body sections, from top to bottom, the head, the thorax, and the abdomen. They have 6 jointed legs and usually have antennae and wings too. Their skeleton is on the outside of their bodies and is hard, similar to the shell of a lobster, a "cousin" of insects.

Spiders and ticks, which are also "cousins" of insects are different in that they have 8 legs, not 6.

<u>Activities</u>: Look closely at an insect such as an ant or a fly to see if you can make out all 3 body sections and spot the 6 legs. You can google "insects" if you want to see more examples.

Draw and color a picture of a real or an imaginary (make believe) insect. Label the head, thorax, and abdomen. Make sure you give your insect 6 legs, 3 on each side.

THE FUTURE OF ELECTRIC VEHICLES: by Jim Shields.

This month, I look at the future of electric vehicles:

- 1. Cars and trucks are responsible for 20% of the U.S.'s warming emissions.
- 2. In the next 2 decades it is predicted that more than 320 million electric vehicles will hit the roads.
- 3. In January, GM announced it would phase out internal combustion engines in its vehicles by 2035. Ford says it will sell only electric vehicles in Europe by 2030. Volkswagen plans to invest \$90 billion on electrifying its vehicles and produce more than 20 million EV's by 2030. Volvo plans to sell only electric vehicles by 2030. Toyota has pledged to launch a pair of all electric cars for 2022.
- 4. There are nearly a dozen EVs on the U.S. market, and prices are becoming more competitive, especially when you figure in the \$7500 federal tax rebate.
- 5. Charging times have dropped, with some models needing just 15 minutes for 200 miles worth of juice, and travelling ranges have also increased.
- 6. EVs are growing more varied, from sport cars to subcompacts, with a slate of electric pickup trucks (including Ford F-150) set to hit the market in the next few years.
- 7. It is projected that by 2030 there will 100 EV models to choose in the U.S. The infrastructure to charge them is following suit. Shell has announced plans to create a global network of 500,000 charging stations by 2025, up from 60,000 today.

Chrome

Under Tools → Clear Browsing Data, ensure that Delete cookies and other site and plugin data is checked.



Safari

From the menu, select Private Browsing ... Under Preferences → Privacy, select

Block Cookies → Always. Consider selecting

Limit website access to location services to prevent location data being disclosed.



Firefox

Under Privacy → Tracking, select Tell web sites I do not want to be tracked, and Never remember history to prevent cookies being remembered. Users can also clear recent history or remove individual cookies.



Internet Explorer under Tools → Delete Browsing History, select Tools → InPrivate Browsing. Also, under Tools → Tracking Protection, select Automatically Block for third-party advertising and Enable.

Request to repeat this:

Banana Bread

1 yellow cake mix

2 eggs

3-4 Bananas

Mash bananas, stir in 2 eggs, mix in the Cake Mix/

I like to put Walnuts in.

Put into greased and floured bread tins.

Bake at 350 for 45 minutes

HOW TO MAKE IRISH POTATO BITES:

- 1 Boil small red potatoes until they are fork tender. Don't over cook them because you want them to be able to hold up to being cut open and stuffed.
- 2 When the potatoes are cooked and have had time to cool cut them in half and scoop out the middle. Save the scooped out potato in a small bowl for later. Cut a thin slice off the bottom of the potato (making sure not to go into the hollow part!) to give it a flat bottom to it on.
- 3 Once all of the potato halves are scooped out take that bowl of saved potato centers and add to it 1/4 cup cheddar cheese, 1/2 cup of diced corned beef, and 1 tablespoon of melted butter.
- 4 Press the mixture into each potato half and then place them on a baking sheet.
- 5 Bake 10 minutes.
