Visioning 2019

One of my sabbatical tasks was to thinl about long-term planning for St. David's. That turns out to be tricky. When I discussed it with Bishop Scruton, he responded that our culture changes so rapidly that true long-term planning is not particularly useful. So much for that idea!

Father Domenic and Sue O'Hare came to my rescue. Domenic suggested a better way to frame the conversation. What is our vision for Saint David's? Where do we see ourselves heading? Where do we want to go? What is God calling us to do now, and for the immediate future?

While I was on sabbatical, Sue invited parishioners to consider a related series of questions. What feeds my soul? Can I do more of that? What no longer feeds my soul? Can I drop it?

We'll gather for a pot-luck meal and conversation about these questions on Monday, October 7 at 6:00. Please plan to join us that evening if you possibly can. If not, please share your thoughts ahead of time with me or with someone on the vestry. Alternatively, write your thoughts down and put them in the marked box in the narthex. We want to include as many people in this conversation as possible.

A few basic ideas structure my own thinking. First, we are all called to grow in the knowledge and love of the God

we know in Jesus Christ. Everything we do should ultimately contribute towards that end.

Our mission statement expresses our parish vision for how we seek to grow in the knowledge and love of God. It is: "As disciples of Jesus Christ, we are called to love God & community, committing ourselves to lives of joyful worship, prayer, and the teaching of Scripture." Our mission statement guides our reflections on our vision for our common life.

From our mission statement, I identify three basic tasks: prayer and worship; life-long Christian formation especially through Bible study; and loving service to our neighbors (our community). Those tasks are non-negotiable, but we have to decide how best to fulfill them.

We also do many other things to support our life together. Some, like responsible budgeting and property maintenance, are essential. Others are more discretionary. For all these additional things, the question is how they can best support our primary tasks.

Such are my general thoughts. But we will need to work together to put flesh on them. Please be part of that conversation!!!

Creation Care by Mary Moore

Ah, October! Fresh, crisp autumn air. While you are enjoying that exhilarating breath, during this, the end of our church's creation season, I'd like you to think for a minute about people whose lives have been adversely affected by climate change. We in Western Massachusetts have been fortunate so far in that we have yet to experience directly what has increasingly become the norm for many on our planet, namely the repercussions of climate change. As Christians, we should care.

Because of increases in the average global air and ocean temperatures, we are seeing changes in wind patterns and ocean currents. These have led to more severe weather in recent years such as the more destructive hurricanes in our own south, or the prolonged droughts in other parts of the country. In addition to the harsher weather, there are other consequences from climate change, some not so obvious to those of us living in The Pioneer Valley, but nonetheless very real for large segments of the world's population. Here are some of the ripple effects of climate change: higher mortality and morbidity from heat stress; increases in the transmission of vector-borne diseases (think mosquitos and ticks); food insecurity (caused by droughts and flooding); and, surprisingly, a higher incidence of mental ill-health as a result of the other stressors.

We will hold our second "Trunk or Treat" in our parking lot on Saturday, October 26 from 3:00 to 5:00. The idea is to decorate your car and hand out candy to the little costumed cuties that come by. Young Scholars Program by Father Harvey

This program offers college scholarships to elementary school students. You read that right—elementary students. The idea is that at-risk children benefit from early interventions. The children come from the MLK Charter School and the White Street School, both in Springfield. The schools nominate promising children. The Young Scholars Program promises money if/when the children actually go to college. In the meantime, the schools and the program combine to offer enrichment and support.



If you would like to join this effort, please talk to me. I have served on the Board of the Program for the last few years, and I strongly recommend their work. You can also check them out online at www.youngscholarsfund.org. The Program can always use money, but the single greatest need is for "scholar mentors." Each mentor tracks one or more students. At a minimum, that means getting their report card each summer. For people with more time, mentors are invited to school events and field trips. I have not been able to do much of that myself, but it is the most rewarding part of the work since it means getting to know the children and their families.

Contemplative Prayer and Lectio Divina

"Lectio Divina" is a prayerful reading of a Bible passage, interspersed with short periods of silence. The basic question we ask ourselves is, what is God saying to me through this passage? We gather on Sundays at 11:45, and wrap up by 12:15. In October, we plan to meet on the twenty-seventh. Please join us!!

Why Statements

The focus at Parish Leadership Day earlier this year was stewardship broadly understood. ("Stewardship is everything that comes after 'I believe"!) Our presenters invited us to think about why we do what we do. In stewardship, that means why we give our time, talent, and/or treasure to the Church. More generally, that means why we cultivate our relationships with God individually and as a parish. We'd love to have a few people share their thoughts on Sunday mornings and/or in writing. Reading the New Testament

We continue to work our way through the New Testament this year. The reading is quite manageable—we read just one chapter each weekday. To encourage broad participation, we include the specific chapters for each week in the bulletin and our weekly e-mails, as well as a link to helpful introductory videos for each book. It's not too late to join the effort!! Just start where we are now. You can go back over the books we have already read later if you like. We'll gather for conversation about what we are reading on Tuesday, October 8 at 2:00. Please join us, even if you aren't current in your reading.

Praying at Home

Versions of both Morning Prayer and Compline appropriate to this season (Pentecost) are available in the narthex, along with a schedule of readings. Pentecost lasts until Advent, which begins on December 1. If you have never prayed any of the Daily Offices, consider giving it a try. It's a wonderful way to add a little time for prayer and engagement with Scripture! And it is not a big time commitment. Depending on how you say it, Morning Prayer takes about 15 minutes, and Compline is under five.

Healing Ministry

Every Sunday after Church, a layperson offers healing prayers at the altar or, if someone prefers privacy, in Father Harvey's office. We have a great group, but could use a few more people to fill out the rotation of pray-ers. Father Harvey meets with interested people for a simple training. Then you pray with people for whatever they request. The prospect can be a little scary, but the experience of praying together before the altar is deeply holy and doesn't require any special skill or eloquence. 
