THE EASTER SEASON:

We rightly put a lot of time and energy into getting ready and then celebrating on Easter morning. It's always a great day. Alleluia, alleluia!

But Easter is more than a single special day. Easter is a season lasting seven weeks. In the Bible, numbers mean different things. Seven is the number of days of creation and therefore is the number of perfection and completion. It is no accident that Easter lasts seven weeks. That is seven sevens—the perfect number twice over!

For all seven weeks, we worship with a little extra joy. We are celebrating Christ's victory over sin and death, so we drop the confession of sin. We throw "alleluias" around wherever we can fit them in. The music is upbeat and joyful.

We face plenty of challenges these days. It's easy to get discouraged at the state of the world. Many of us have personal challenges. But the tomb was empty all those centuries ago. Christ is risen. Christ is alive. And that means God wins. Life wins. Love wins.

As it happens, this year the weather seems likely to cooperate with the liturgical calendar. At my house, crocuses are already up. A daffodil bloomed where I park my car on Easter morning! At this very moment, snow is on the ground, but I anticipate that during the Easter season, nature should burst into abundant life all around us!

During the Easter season, I encourage you to take a little time to appreciate God's blessings in your life—the people, places, events, opportunities, and so on that bring you joy. They are little grace moments, glimpses of resurrection life. And the practice of pausing to notice and give thanks may well be the best way to celebrate Easter. Alleluia, alleluia!!

SPOTLIGHT ON MINISTRIES:

CREATION CARE by Mary Moore

Genesis 2:15 "The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it."

While for centuries the above statement from Genesis was cited as evidence for man's right to be in charge and to exploit nature, it is now interpreted to mean exactly what it says. It is <u>our responsibility to take care</u> of the earth. As such, the Episcopal Church offers this vision and these goal statements for the Creation Care Ministry.

Vision statement:

The Jesus Movement is the ongoing community of people whose lives are centered on Jesus of Nazareth. We follow him into loving, liberating, life-giving relationship with God, with each other <u>and with Creation</u>. (my underlining) **Goals** -

Loving - Goal #1 - Create and sustain a network of Episcopalians dedicated to the care and protection of the whole Creation, especially by providing grants and cultivating circles for Story Sharing among practitioners in local and regional ministries.

Liberating - Goal #2 - Stand in solidarity with the most vulnerable victims of the impact of climate change - particularly women, poor people, and people of color - as part of seeking the liberation and flourishing of all God's people.

Life-Giving - Goal #3 - Set climate change mitigation benchmarks as individuals and as a church, in order to live more simply, humbly, and gently on the Earth.

How does this play out at Saint David's? While we have three visible members in our Creation Care Ministry (Jim Shields, Mary Moore, and Pauline Mortenson), in reality this ministry includes many, perhaps even most, of our parishioners. Anyone who takes actions that are designed to help the environment should consider himself/herself to be part of this ministry. Look again at Goal #3: "as individuals and as a church ... live more simply, humbly, and gently. "There are three major ways by which we do this, 1) not over-consuming goods or energy, 2) directly helping plants and animals, and 3) restoring.

Here is a list of examples and how each action helps. (Also the names of some parishioners known by me to take a particular action. I am sure that you could provide many more names.)

*Plant a vegetable garden and/or buy local produce - cuts down on transportation distances (i.e. on fuel consumption) and can also provide food for animals such as bees. (Denise, Norma)

*Plant a flower garden - helps pollinators and birds. (Pauline, Jean C.) Note: Be careful NOT to buy flowers that have been treated with chemicals that kill bees.

*Plant native species instead of non-native species - helps the existing ecosystem.

*Plant trees - a restorative action (Norma, Harvey)

*Feed birds - directly helps birds & consequently their ecosystems. (Jim)

*Consolidate errands to cut down on driving - reduces fuel consumption, means fewer pollutants being spewed out into the atmosphere.

*Hang clothes outside to dry when possible - cuts down energy consumption.

*Before turning up the thermostat in cold weather, try wearing a sweater first. - cuts down on fuel consumption.

*River cleanup - helps plants and animals by removing pollutants. (Marcel, Virginia, Jim, Harvey)

*Walk when possible - cuts down on gas consumption; is a way to enjoy nature

The list could go on, but you get the point. Awareness is the key. If we are aware of the consequences of our actions, we can be more intentional about making choices that are good for the environment. Thank you for all you do! Come join us on one of our hikes! And check out our bulletin board.

WINE MINISTRY by Mary Moore

Our Wine Ministry started somewhat by accident. We inherited some equipment and the kit with the ingredients for making a 5 gallon batch of red wine from a group at one of the other area Episcopal churches. Paul Fontaine and Jim Shields were interested in making the wine, and I joined them because I already had more than 20 years of winemaking under my belt. Our first batch of communion wine led to another, then another, and eventually to over 100 bottles from the additional kits that we had bought.

Covid and the ensuing remote Sunday services meant no need for church wine temporarily, turning our surplus into a glut. What to do with all that extra wine? The solution was to have an <u>outdoor</u> wine tasting at a private residence, following all the covid precautions. If anyone wanted a bottle to bring home, there were suggested donations, all of which went to Saint David's. That first wine tasting has now become an annual event, with bottles of various wines available year round too. And we are back to providing all the communion wine.

Our present crew consists of Lin and Dan Paquette and Mary Moore. We make mostly standard wines such as Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay, and Riesling. Nothing fancy. Around Thanksgiving and Christmas, we will sometimes make a dessert wine, depending on the availability of the kits. We also handle the cleaning, sanitizing, filling, corking, and labeling of the bottles.

All equipment, labor, and wine kits are provided by the members of this ministry. There is a *suggested* donation for a bottle of wine, but for anyone on a low fixed income, we ask that you donate what you feel comfortable with. 100% of the money we collect goes directly into the church's general fund. If you want wine but can't reach one of us, you can call the church office @ (413) 786-6133. Not all wines are available at all times, but generally speaking, there is at least one type of red, and one type of white wine on hand.

Earth Day!

The first Earth Day was in April, 1970. It started as a full day of teaching people how to help the planet by showing them how to take care of nature. Probably the most important idea that came out of the first Earth Day was that more people started to see themselves as part of nature instead of separate from it. To put this in everyday terms, think about your house and a neighbor's house. Whose house is your family going to take care of, yours or your neighbor's? Just as you think of the house next door as not your problem, a lot of people used to think that taking care of nature was not their problem. Nature was where plants and animals lived, not where people lived. Now we know better. What if the neighbors house was your cousin's house? Would you be a little more careful about their property than you would if a stranger lived there? Remember: we are "cousins" to every other living thing on the planet.

Things you can do:

1) Try not to be wasteful.

2) Don't litter.

3) Get friends involved too. They can help you with #'s 1 & 2.

4) Ask a teacher if your school does anything special for Earth Day. If the answer is "No," ask if kids and teachers could have a cleanup day, some special lessons about taking care of nature, or perhaps some other Earth Day activity. The teachers can find lots of good ideas and information on the internet.
