# A Holy Advent

Please consider this an invitation to a holy Advent.

Advent, and the new Christian year, began on Sunday, December 3. Inside this issue of the *Dove-tale*, you will find lots of ways you can observe the new season, both at Church and at home. I hope you will take advantage of many of them.

We will experience these weeks differently. Many of us will be busy with family and friends. Others of us may find this a difficult time as they struggle with loneliness or grief. All of us will be besieged with advertising and other messages telling us how we should feel, and what we should be doing, and mostly where we should spend our money. That is the reality of the Christmas season in contemporary America.

But in this season, the Church invites us to spend time in prayer and self-reflection, in preparation and hopefulness, in gratitude and loving service. What specific Advent activities work for you doesn't matter so much. But I encourage everyone to spend some intentional time with God over the next four weeks. Advent is a holy season of preparation to welcome our Lord come Christmas, as well as to grow in our relationship with God in the coming year.

I also encourage everyone to let others know what you are doing to observe Advent. There is, I think, a spiritual hunger in contemporary America that only God can satisfy. But many people need a little encouragement to address that deepest need.

The Christmas season is a complicated time. But whatever else it is, it is also a time when people expect to hear about the Christ child, when people's attention turns to worship at least some of the time, when people pause to reflect on what matters most.

My prayer for us in this season is that our lives witness to what truly matters.

Other Churches and even a Jewish Cantor lead the sessions on the remaining Mondays. Our collective efforts impressed the Bishop enough that we got a mention in his Convention address! The women we are there to serve are a good group. As I have heard from many of the leaders, we may well learn more than the prisoners!! This month, the fourth Monday falls on Christmas Day, which means the study is cancelled by the prison administration. But Terry will spread the good news of Advent on December 4, and my gang will be back at it on January 22.

# SACRED GROUND OPPORTUNITY: by Fr. Harvey

Sacred Ground is a film and book-based discussion series around issues of racism and Beloved Community. A few years ago, we teamed up with Saint Andrew's, Longmeadow to participate in a couple of Sacred Ground Circles, and I believe all those who participated would agree that it was a powerful and illuminating experience. The Beloved Community Commission of our Diocese is setting up a Zoom circle for interested people. #### THE CHOSEN: by Fr. Harvey

The result is a fresh telling of the story. So far the series has run three seasons of something like eight episodes each, with four more seasons to come. # CHRISTMAS SCHEDULE, by Fr. Harvey

We have a lot going on! A full schedule is posted in the narthex and included with my weekly email blasts, as well as listed on the calendar in this issue of the Dovetale. Here I'll be brief. I have organized events topically.

*Worship:* The first three of our Friday noon services of Holy Eucharist will have an Advent theme, although I'm not entirely sure what that will look like(!). The service on Friday December 22 will have a Blue Christmas theme.

Our Christmas Pageant will happen during the 10:00 service on December 17. The final Sunday of Advent is the morning of the 24<sup>th</sup>. That evening is our Christmas Eve service at 6:00. On Christmas Day, we'll have a single, quiet service at 9:00. And on December 31, we'll have Lessons and Carols at 10:00 (and a regular service at 8:00).

*Children*: Breakfast with Santa will be Saturday, December 9 from 9:00 to 11:00. As always, the event is free and open to the public. Please help spread the word! Children will rehearse for the Christmas pageant during Sunday School on 12/3 and 10. As noted above, the pageant itself will happen at the 10:00 service on December 17. Thanks to everyone involved in making it happen!

# Advent Retreat: O Love, How Deep, How Broad, How High, on zoom Saturday, December 16 from 9:30 to 12:00 on Zoom

Guided by the Rev. Dr. Margaret Bullitt-Jonas, participants will enjoy a morning of listening, prayer, and conversation as they open themselves to the presence of Divine Love. The time together will include presentations, guided meditation, and gathering in small groups. Registration is free. See me for details.

*Outreach*: We continue with our usual outreach: the Veterans Lunch and Church without Walls. We will also collect food for the Parish Cupboard, and the Prayer Shawl Ministry is making hats and scarves for the needy. You might consider giving "Gifts for Life" this year instead of regular gifts. That is when you donate things like a well or a flock of chicks to a needy family in honor of someone you love. You can give these gifts through organizations like Episcopal Relief and Development. We have several catalogs in the narthex.

The main thing we do as a Church is the Agawam Christmas Project. *Jude and Sue O'Hare have coordinating it* for last year. As of this writing, Sue is still involved in this ministry, along with Dixie Lauzon and friends. We have the first set of names, as well as an option for donating gifts to the Senior Center. All gifts should be returned to the Church by December 14 at the latest. We'll deliver them on the 15th.

*Formation*: Here, too, we continue with our regular round of online Morning Prayer, Bible study, and similar offerings. We also have Advent devotionals in the narthex, as well as seasonal forms for saying Morning Prayer or Compline at home. We will have an Advent-Wreath making session on the first Sunday of Advent (12/3). That's a great Advent home devotional practice.

After the 10:00 service on December 10 and 17, we'll have a conversation about how we are each experiencing Advent. I am using a devotional by Victoria and Frank Logue called *Feasts of* Feasts, and I have extra copies if anyone would like one.

And on Tuesday, December 12 at 6:00PM, we'll watch and discuss the Christmas Special of the series *The Chosen*.

# Creation Care Kids' Corner by Mary Moore

Look for these:

\* On warm days, some animals that are not true hibernators may wake up and leave their nest or den for a little while. On these days you may see black bears, chipmunks, or skunks.

\* Just before the middle of the month, on clear nights, you may see some shooting stars from the Geminid meteor shower. Another name for a shooting star is meteorite. When a meteor (a big chunk of rock) enters the Earth's atmosphere, the friction between it and the atmosphere makes the rock get so hot that it burns up. The burning rock is called a meteorite. Friction is 2 objects rubbing against each other. The faster the rubbing, the hotter things get. Imagine how fast the meteorite has to be traveling to in order to burn! Activity: Rub your hands together really fast. Can you feel them heat up?

\* The winter solstice is always on either December 20, 21, or 22. This is the day when the sun rises and sets as far south as it will ever get in the sky in the Northern Hemisphere, and we have the least amount of daylight. Where we live in Massachusetts, the sun will be setting before 4:30 in the afternoon on these days. Activity: If it is not cloudy on any of the 3 dates mentioned above, look towards the west and notice how far south the sun is at sunset. (When you are looking to the west, south is to your left.) If you remember six months later, you can do this at sunset again, on the summer solstice in June. But look to the northwest instead, because this is the day when the sun rises and sets as far north as it will ever be in the Northern Hemisphere.

The Dovetale will have a new feature called MY WHY STATEMENT.



# MY WHY STATEMENT by Jim Shields

#### 11/30/23

I was originally exposed to the Episcopal Church as a child, growing up in Longmeadow. We then switched to the Congregationalist church in town, where I was later confirmed in High School. Church was a good experience for me, but I must admit I was not particularly engaged, and as I moved on in life and went to college, church was not one of my priorities. Fast forward to 1984, my wild days largely behind me, I am married and have a beautiful daughter. My wife (who was raised Catholic) and I had a common desire to expose our daughter to the benefits of a Christian church (and home!) experience and thought that the Episcopal church would be a good fit. We found St. David's Church and checked it out. It was Bible-based, welcoming, had a good Sunday School program, it seemed to suit our needs perfectly. But we were primarily there for our daughter, truth be told. We even often took turns taking our daughter to church, to the extent that some folks wondered if were married! Then a funny thing happened: we both really started to like the services, and we felt the Holy Spirit steadily working on us, and before long we were hooked on St. David's. Since those early days, much has happened in my life. My 2 children are grown, I am retired, unmarried, and a rock 'n roll drummer. The one constant in my life has been St. David's. My faith and spiritual growth have increased steadily through these 40 years of Sunday worship, Bible study, Confirmation, Vestry membership, multiple Ministry involvement, and fabulous Fellowship with my fellow parishioners. Sunday morning church is the hi-lite of my week. I have been incredibly blessed by God for bringing me back into the church, and to St David's in particular.
