#### STEWARDSHIP OF WORKS AND WISDOM (by Ted Zern)

*More Than Enough,* the theme for this year's pledge campaign, calls us to remember that when we share what we have, good things happen. Our theology of giving focuses on the three-legged stool of Time, Talent and Treasure, or *Wealth, Works, and Wisdom*. All three components of the stool are ways in which we share our gifts with the world as thanks for the blessings God has bestowed.

The stewardship campaign at St. David's is configured as two phases, first our Treasure or Wealth which has recently been gratefully pledged. As we approach the Lenten season, we turn to gifts of Time and Talent or Works and Wisdom. All three point to our life and calling as Christians, as St. James reminds us in his epistle. It is not enough to simply believe, but we must act on that faith to serve each other, our neighbors and change the world, even for a brief moment.

On Sunday, February 19, St. David's offers a chance to give thanks for the blessings of time granted for works of the heart, and the blessings of talent or wisdom acquired through our unique life experience. On that date, the 2023 stewardship campaign turns from consideration of financial gifts to one of spiritual gifts, i.e. the more intangible **gifts from the heart that perhaps define us as God's children**.

#### Time versus Talent?

We often talk about time and talent as if these were one concept. It is true these often go together but there is also a difference. You don't need any special talent to engage in service to others or act from the heart, most often just your presence is needed. Keep this in mind when considering how you might give of your time. So, then what is Talent? It may be some unique ability we have but it is also the life experience that we can share or the wisdom we have acquired through that experience. Most simply, these two components represent the wise and responsible use of the gifts God has entrusted to each of us.

#### Why is It Important?

Our lives have real meaning only when we use our gifts and our time in accordance with God's will. As we grow in stewardship, we grow in our relationship with God. It stems from the belief that God has created each of us to act on our faith and share what we can with those around us.

#### How Can I Be a Good Steward of My Time and Talent?

Put God at the center of your life. We are given opportunities each day to be good stewards by using the blessings God has given us, by sharing the unique abilities or life experience which we have been granted. Similarly, no gift is greater than time, and yet, nothing is so easy to waste. Time spent in prayer, nurturing relationships or just enjoying the world's beauty is time well spent. No special talent is required.

#### What are My Talents?

We often hold back from recognizing our gifts because of a narrow definition of "talent." We think "talented people" are extraordinary achievers or have easily identifiable gifts, such as music or art. Talents can also include being a good listener, being able to organize people, relating well to children or teens, and being patient with others. It can be as simple as a kind word spoken to another or the ability to offer support in a time of crisis. As Christians, we recognize that our gifts are meant to be cultivated and shared with others through family and friends, church, community and with the world.

## How Can I Be a Good Steward of My Talents?

Begin by recognizing the talents or wisdom you have been given. Be open to the leading of the Holy Spirit. Let go of preconceived ideas about yourself. Be still and listen with the "ear of the heart." Reflect on your life experience and think about how even a piece of it may have prepared you to share in the life of the church or community.

## What are a Few Practical Ways to Share My Time and Talents?

Be available to your family and friends, maybe a phone call or note to another member of the parish, just to check in.

Be a participant in the life of the church, at worship but also in other activities of the faith community.

Be on the lookout for volunteer opportunities in the greater community and then perhaps act on one that strikes your interest, even if you have no previous experience.

### An Invitation to Action---Thoughts to Consider

Do something for yourself and your relationship with God, perhaps a Bible study or commit to morning prayer or try contemplative prayer or participate in a Lenten Study or any adult formation opportunity.

Make weekly worship a priority and engage at least one person each week in conversation. (after worship of course)

Check in on family and friends whom you may not have seen in a while or those whom you know might be having a difficult time in his or her life.

Stay alert for a call for volunteers and then answer the call by asking, how can I help?

Help to conduct or lead fellowship events at church; get to know your church family.

Seek out potential ways you can share your gifts through the various ministries of the congregation. Most of these are reflected on the commitment form.

Commitment forms will be included in the Sunday bulletin preceding the 19<sup>th</sup> and can also be found on the table in the Narthex. Offer your time and talent on Sunday, February19 by completing the declaration form with your commitments marked and send it to the church office, drop in the plate at Sunday worship or simply email the Pledge Secretary, Ted Zern, with your selection(s) to tzern2010@gmail.com. Ted will make sure that your commitments are directed in the appropriate manner with thanks and blessings.

As we anticipate the onset of the Lenten season, perhaps it is not only a time to consider what we might give up, but rather what we can give. May we all seek a deeper relationship with God.

#### CARE OF THE ATMOSPHERE: By Pauline Mortenson

The Interior Department is proposing to lease to wind-energy producers 373,268 acres off the California coast. This is the first lease of its kind in the Pacific Ocean.

(If you would like to join in a bit later, just let Fr. Harvey know.) On Shrove Tuesday, we'll put all the names in a hat and then draw names. Please join us!

#### **COMPLAINT-FREE LENT**

This is another wonderful Lent option. The basic idea is to wear a purple bracelet that reminds us not to complain. Every time we do complain despite the reminder, we put aside a little money. At the end of Lent, we donate the collected money to a good cause. Those who have participated in past years will remember how helpful this practice can be. But I warn anyone who hasn't participated before: don't commit to putting aside much money for each complaint. It can really add up!! The purple bracelets will be available in the narthex beginning on Sunday, February 19 and continuing throughout Lent (while supplies last). Please join the "fun"!

#### SHROVE TUESDAY

On Ash Wednesday Eve (aka Shrove Tuesday), we'll have our traditional Pancake Supper, complete with King Cake! It's February 21. Join us at 6:00. Mardi Gras beads optional!

#### ASH WEDNESDAY

Our Ash Wednesday Service is tentatively scheduled for 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, February 22. I strongly encourage everyone to join us or watch the service from home. Ash Wednesday is one of the most solemn and holy services of the entire Christian year, and the best way to kick off a holy Lent. We may also offer "Ashes to Go" from 6:00-7:00 PM for those who can't join us in person for the service.

#### Lent Madness

Based loosely on the NCAA basketball tournament, this online devotion pits saints against one another in a bracket as voters choose their favorites throughout the penitential season of Lent. Here's how to participate: on the weekdays of Lent, beginning on February 23, information is posted at www.lentmadness.org about two different saints. Each pairing remains open for 24 hours as participants read about and then vote to determine which saint moves on to the next round. If you're looking for a Lenten discipline that is fun, educational, occasionally goofy, and always joyful, join the Lent Madness journey. Lent needn't be all doom and gloom. After all, what could be more joyful than a season specifically set aside to get closer to Jesus Christ?

I invite you, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and selfdenial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word." BCP, 265)

He was a teacher and Rector of churches in the islands of Jamaica, Bahamas, Turks and Caicos and here in the USA. He has initiated and spear headed many groups that aid women and children. The list of his involvement is far too long to note, but include him as Archdeacon overseeing thirty-Three Episcopal Churches in New York.

#### COMMUNITY DINNERS by Bob and Jo

2023 has started out busy for the Kitchen Crew, especially Bob. I would like give an short overall view of what is involved with putting on our Community Dinners.

First step is of course choosing a menu, Second picking a date that will not interfere with Church events. Make flyers, tickets and sign-up sheets for volunteers Making a shopping list. Do the shopping usually a couple days before dinner. Prepping food (usually day before dinner) Moving chairs and setting up tables. (difficult need 3-4 people) Bob has to determine when he can turn the room so as not to interfere with renters. Setting up place mats, steam tables, serving tables. Now to the kitchen: If the gas has been shut off, then the piolet lights have to be relit. (I believe there are a total of 14 lights, all the surface burners, grill and 2 ovens ) Making sure pans are available and CLEAN to getting food ready for cooking. Estimate the time to start each course so as to be ready for serving at 6:00. Setting up for the Take Out orders. Thanks Virginia!!

Now that everyone has been served, it is time to reverse the procedure. CLEAN UP! Bob has to make sure the room is now back to a Church.

However, it is usually the same people each time. Yes, we have lots of laughs, especially at the beginning of the process, but by 8:00 p.m. everyone is ready for home.

What I am observing, is that before the Pandemic we usually had 60-70 guests for each dinner. Now we are averaging around 40-45. What has happened? Our members are getting older and not going out as much. We have had to increase our ticket prices to cover supplies. Our younger families that used to come to church and dinners, now have Children engaging in school sports.

Advertising costs a lot, so how do we get word out to the public?

If anyone has any suggestions, PLEASE feel free to come to our next meeting. We will post date and time soon.
