Listening for God's Call

A theme is gradually emerging for this year at Saint David's: listening for God's call.

During my sabbatical last summer, one of my goals was to think and pray about next steps for us in our common journey. I tried to ask myself, what is God calling us to do now? When I returned, we had a first session to think about that question together, and we'll have more in the near future.

In the meantime, new ministry opportunities have opened up. The Veter-

ans Lunches are off and running. A Bible Study at the Chicopee Women's Prison and a Yoga Class at Saint David's are gearing up. And we are in conversation about a possible expansion to our gardens in order to grow food.

There is more. At the last vestry meeting, the vestry voted to increase my weekly hours from 20 to 25 beginning in the fall. That is an exciting opportunity for me, and I like to think it would be good for the Church. But it also throws our budget out of balance. Over the course of this year, we will need to reflect prayerfully on whether or not this increase is truly God's will for us.

As I write this, we are preparing to welcome Deacon Terry Hurlbut, who

along with his wife Lainey, will join us beginning on January 19. Their presence will be a wonderful gift for us! But to the best of my knowledge we have not had a Deacon at Saint David's in the past. Over the next several weeks, we will therefore be working with Terry to discern the shape of his ministry among us.

And, of course, our annual meeting comes up at the end of January (and so will have happened by the time you read this.) Annual meeting is the one time we formally come together as an entire parish to discuss our

common life together, to listen for God, and to share our visions for our future.

We are now in the Epiphany season. Epiphany means a manifestation of God to God's people. Our Epiphany task (though it will continue all year!!) is to be on the lookout for God's presence all around us. We need to be listening for God's call.

So I end by asking everyone to please pray for our parish. Ask God for guidance and help as we take the next steps in our common relationship with Jesus Christ. Alleluia Alleluia!!



Lent Begins!

As the title says, Lent begins this month! As always, we'll have a Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper on the Tuesday before Lent (2/25), an Ash Wednesday service at 7:00 on the day itself (2/26), begin walking the Stations of the Cross every Friday at 11:30 (beginning 2/28), and have a Lent formation program beginning the first week of March.

For the Lent Formation Program, I will lead us in a discussion of the Apostle Paul based on my work during my summer sabbatical. The main question as I write this article is when our formation program should happen. In recent years, we have met immediately after the 10:00 service on Sunday mornings, and we could do that again. Another possibility is Tuesday evenings, perhaps with food. If you are interested in participating and the time makes a difference to you, please let me know your thoughts. We want to do this when it is most convenient for the largest number. Thanks!!

Ash Wednesday Service

Our Ash Wednesday Service will be at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, February 26. Please make a special effort to join us for that service. It is one of the most solemn and holy services of the entire Christian year, and the best way to kick off a holy Lent.

Complaint-Free Lent

This was a wonderful discipline brought to us a couple of years ago by Penny Miller. The basic idea is to wear a purple bracelet that reminds us not to complain. Every time we do complain despite the reminder, we put aside a little money. At the end of Lent, we donate the collected money to a good cause. Those who participated last year will remember how helpful this practice was. But I warn anyone who didn't participate last year: don't commit to putting aside much money for each complaint. It can really add up!! The purple bracelets will be available in the narthex during Lent. Please join the "fun"!

Lent Prayer Partners

This is our second year to have Prayer Partners, and I can say from experience that it is a really wonderful practice. On the two Sundays before Lent begins (2/16 and 2/23), I will invite everyone interested in having a partner to write their name, address, and a prayer request on a slip of paper, and to leave it in a basket. On February 23, everyone who has put in a prayer request will draw one. Each participant will then pray for their "prayer partner" every day during Lent. Finally, on Easter, each participant will send an Easter Card to his or her prayer partner offering God's blessings on that person. This is a great way to support each other as a community of faith. Please join us!

Lent Madness

Based loosely on the NCAA basketball tournament, this online devotion pits saints against one another in a bracket as voters choose their favorites throughout the penitential season of Lent. Here's how to participate: on the weekdays of Lent, beginning on February 27, information is posted at www.lentmadness.org about two different saints. Each pairing remains open for 24 hours as participants read about and then vote to determine which saint moves on to the next round. If you're looking for a Lenten discipline that is fun, educational, occasionally goofy, and always joyful, join the Lent Madness journey. Lent needn't be all doom and gloom. After all, what could be more joyful than a season specifically set aside to get closer to Jesus Christ?

Church Without Walls by Father Harvey

Our Church without walls service was a little smaller than usual last month. We like to think it may have been because we switched weeks with another Church. Our people didn't expect us on the first Sunday of the month, and some didn't make as big an effort to attend as they might have if they had known we would be there. Or maybe it just happened—who knows?

One benefit of the smaller group was that we could interact with each person more intimately. One had recently lost a lot of money by his standards and was feeling discouraged. Another was clearly glad to see us and thanked us several times for being there. The third was quiet, but seemed fully engaged in our conversation about the Gospel reading for the day. I was, as always, proud to be part of this ministry, and moved by the experience. Thanks once again to everyone who makes it possible!!

Building Bridges Veterans Ministry

Our second Veterans Lunch was another great success! (We had to cancel the December meal because of snow, so it was in January.) Thanks to John and the Lions for preparing a great meal, and to the host of volunteers who made the whole event run smoothly. As always, we began with our vestry prayer and a brief discussion of the Gospel reading for the following Sunday. We reviewed the financials and the minutes from the last meeting. We chatted about various things effecting our common life at Saint David's. The single most important at this meeting was approving our 2020 budget. We wrapped up a little after 8:30. 2020 Vestry

So did Paul Fontaine, but I am happy to report that Paul agreed to serve another term and so remains. Mary Moore is the other new regular vestry member, and Cherie McCurdy is our new Clerk. They join Senior Warden Carol Fabrycki, Junior Warden Bob Rendrick, Treasurer Jude O'Hare; Assistant Treasurer Denise Noyes; and continuing members Anne Berry, Pauline Mortenson, Linda Seabury, and Jim Shields. Please thank them all for their service!

Our Vestry and the Budget

The budget is now complete and available in the Annual Meeting booklet. I draw your attention to two things. First, we have a deficit this year, which comes largely from increasing my hours from 20 to 25 each week. The vestry and I hope we can make that happen in the fall, but we will be watching the numbers carefully. In the meantime, please continue to be on the lookout for ways that we can earn money, particularly by renting space in our building. It sits empty much of the time and could be earning needed funds. Second, different vestry members are in charge of different budget lines. Who is in charge of what will be determined at the vestry retreat in early February. As soon as the information is available, we will post it on the bulletin board opposite the office. If you need to spend the Church's money, please fill out the form and get the relevant vestry person's signature beforehand. Thanks!!

Annual Meeting

As I write this, our annual meeting is in the future. By the time you read it, the meeting will have passed. All I can say for now is what we plan for the meeting. It will happen on January 26 (I hope!!!). We will elect new vestry members and representatives to Diocesan Convention. We will present the 2020 budget. And we will discuss issues important for our common life, including our deficit, the replacement for the rug in the Church, the possibility of expending our gardens, and more. I want to add in advance my thanks to everyone who participates and who makes it happen!

Online Directory and Community Bulletin Board

We will talk about both of these at our Annual Meeting (still in the future as I write this), which may alter our plans. But as of this moment, we are hoping to create a password-protected online directory on our webpage. We will eventually include the information in our Book of Names. (We'll also produce a printed 2020 Book of Names in the near future.) But first we want to give people plenty of time to opt out altogether and/or to tell us what information they are not comfortable being included. Once the directory is complete, people can add photos to their entry if they so choose.

We also hope to create a "community bulletin board" on our webpage. The idea is that people can list things they would like to give away or sell, skills they have, etc. In another place on the bulletin board, people can request help or make prayer requests. Exactly what form the bulletin board will take is not yet determined. But I am hopeful we can get something up and running in the next few weeks.

I want to add a note of profound gratitude for all the work Laurie Littlefield regularly puts into our webpage, and for her help in making these latest improvements happen!!!

Yoga Class

Our Yoga class has begun. This is an experiment, but we hope to keep it going. The first round of classes lasts 8 weeks, beginning January 21 on Tuesdays from 3:00 to 4:00. The cost to Saint David's is roughly \$60 per person for the whole series. We have paid the instructor, so please make checks out to Saint David's, with "yoga" in the subject line. If \$60 is a hardship, just pay what you can. The same is true if you choose to participate in individual sessions. Just write a check for what feels right and fits your budget. Thanks to Linda Seabury for organizing the class!!

College Scholarships

Two scholarships are available for members of Saint David's who plan to head to college next fall. The Bement Scholarship is offered by the Diocese, and the application is due on March 1 (Saint David's Day!!). We administer the Boissonneault Scholarship, which is specific to Saint David's. For more information on either, please talk to Father Harvey.

Community Solar

We have entered into a contract with a company called Nexamp to save some money and do something good for the environment at the same time. We will continue to receive power bills from Eversource. But, and here is where it gets a little complicated, Eversource will also credit us the full amount of the bill, and then charge Nexamp for the power we have used. Nexamp pays Eversource, and then bills us for the same electricity. Since the electricity is generated by solar panels, and so earns tax credits, they can offer us a 15% discount on the power we have used.

At the moment, no panels are available in our area, so we are on a waiting list. They anticipate that we should be up and running by about June. I believe the same deal is available for private homes. If you decide to pursue it, please tell them you heard about the deal from us—that gives us a little bonus.

Prison Ministry

A year or so ago, Mary D'Allesandro, the diocesan missioner to the Chicopee Women's Prison, came to Saint David's to talk about how we might get involved. Several people expressed interest, and we collected a handful of backpacks to share with women when they get released. (Mary told us this was a pressing need.) We are now taking another step. Father Harvey has teamed up with several other Churches to put together a weekly Bible Study at the Prison on Tuesday nights at 7:00. A few people have expressed interest in participating in the Bible Study, which requires pre-clearance to get into the prison. Other people may want to support this effort from behind the scenes.

Getting started has proved a little harder than we expected. At this point, we are all set to go. But we are waiting until some of the women sign up. The plan is for us to work with minimum security women, and here are only 15 of them at the moment. Hopefully several of them will express interest in the near future. In the meantime, if you are interested in learning more, please talk to Father Harvey.

Film Recommendation: *The Two Popes* by Fr. Harvey

The two Popes in question are Pope Benedict—now Pope Emeritus—and Pope Francis. The film tells the true story of their meeting towards the end of Benedict's pontificate. As the film begins, the future Pope Francis expresses his desire to retire as Cardinal Archbishop of Argentina. Benedict refuses to accept the resignation, and instead announces his own plans to retire. Over the course of the film, the two men develop a genuine affection and respect for each other. The final scene, when they watch a soccer match between Germany and Argentina together, is simply fabulous!

I learned about this film from the recommendation of two parishioners, and was very glad of it. The film is interesting and enjoyable. But its significance runs deeper than that. Benedict is unapologetically conservative. Francis is more liberal. Both are portrayed sympathetically. And watching the two learn to trust and appreciate each other, despite their enduring differences, is a hopeful message for us in our polarized political climate. The film is available on Netflix.

Flooring for the Church

The conversation about replacing the carpet in the Church is well under way. There are a variety of options, each with different strengths and weaknesses, which makes the decision difficult. One option—probably the leading option at this moment, but things could change quickly!—is a carpet up the center aisle, with flooring under the chairs. But concerns remain particularly about scratches on the floor and the risk of tripping over the area where the carpet and the floor meet. The vestry therefore decided to hold off on making a final decision until we can see how the floor in the narthex weathers the winter. But we will make the decision in the next month or two, so, if you want to be part of the conversation, please speak to any vestry member. We want to know what people are thinking!

Expanding Our Gardens?

I recently learned about a start-up Church in Los Angeles that formed around small garden plots in the city. They structured their children's programs around the garden, and they used the food they grew for Church meals and outreach. It occurred to me that we could possibly do something similar. Already last summer Denise Noyes and her family grew vegetables in two small raised-bed gardens behind our parking lot. We could expand on their efforts, and probably get most of the cost covered by the Diocese. The question is, who would help maintain the plots? We don't want to overburden the people who already do a LOT on our grounds! We'll only go forward if there is interest in the project. If we do go forward, we'll decide how much area to cultivate based on the level of interest. So, please let Father Harvey know if you would like to participate. Please also feel free to invite friends who may not be part of Saint David's. We welcome any and all!

Leadership Training

Good leadership is, of course, vital to the health of our parish. We have been blessed with outstanding lay leadership during my entire time serving here, for which I thank God!! In an effort to keep that tradition going, the Vestry is considering a program subsidized by the Diocese and run by The Rev. Peter Swarr and Sue Schneider of Saint Mark's, East Longmeadow. Churches that have participated in the program have found it very helpful both for established leaders who may be looking for a change and a next generation of leaders who are looking for ways to become more involved. If that sounds interesting to you, please speak to me. Presuming we go forward this year, it will happen in the fall.

Snow Policy

As a reminder: Saint David's will always be closed if Agawam High School closes for the day because of snow. On Sunday mornings, we have to make that call ourselves. When Church is closed, notice will appear on our webpage and on television stations 3, 6, 40, and 22. All meetings are presumed to be cancelled, including any meetings by outside groups that rent the Church property. Our full snow policy is posted on the bulletin board by the office. Thanks!

Diocesan Events

In the near future, the Diocese is sponsoring two events that may be of interest. On March 14, Episcopalians from around the Diocese will join our Congregational counterparts for "Super Saturday." In past years, we called this event "Parish Leadership Day." There are literally dozens of workshops about how best to be Church in our time. We would love to be well-represented. The other event is the third "Small Church Summit," on February 29. We sent a team to the second summit and found it very helpful. At least five of us are going again, but there is always room for more. For this one, too, talk to Father Harvey if you are interested in participating.

This event will be held on Sunday, February 16 after the 10:00 a.m. service. We are usually done before 1 p.m. and each child takes home some slime.

Young Scholars Program

This program offers college scholarships to elementary school students. You read that right—elementary students. The idea is that promising but at-risk children benefit from early interventions. The children come from the MLK Charter School and the White Street School, both in Springfield. The schools nominate promising children. The Young Scholars Program commits money if/when the children actually go to college. In the meantime, the schools and the program combine to offer enrichment and support.



If you would like to join this effort, please talk to me. I have served on the Board of the Program for the last few years, and I strongly recommend their work. You can also check them out online at www.youngscholarsfund.org. The Program can always use money, but the single greatest need is for "scholar mentors." Each mentor tracks one or more students. At a minimum, that means getting their report card each summer. For people with more time, mentors are invited to school events and field trips. I have not been able to do much of that myself, but it is the most rewarding part of the work since it means getting to know the children and their families.

Contemplative Prayer and Lectio Divina

"Lectio Divina" is a prayerful reading of a Bible passage, interspersed with short periods of silence. The basic question we ask ourselves is, what is God saying to me through this passage? We gather on the fourth Sunday of the month at 11:45, and wrap up by 12:15. In February, that is the 22nd. Please join us!!

Reading the New Testament

We finished up our year of reading the New Testament in December, and then started all over again! I invite—indeed strongly encourage—everyone to join in the effort. The reading is quite manageable—we read just one chapter each weekday. And spending time with Scripture is one of the best ways to deepen your relationship with Jesus Christ. That's what it is all about!

Healing Ministry

Every Sunday after Church, a layperson offers healing prayers at the altar or, if someone prefers privacy, in Father Harvey's office. We have a great group, but could use a few more people to fill out the rotation of pray-ers. Father Harvey meets with interested people for a simple training. Then you pray with people for whatever they request. The prospect can be a little scary, but the experience of praying together before the altar is deeply holy and doesn't require any special skill or eloquence.
