THE SOUND SYSTEM:

Sound is a perennial problem at every Church, as best I can tell. Certainly, we are no exception! But we have recently made two improvements that should help.

For people in the Church, we have always made available earpieces directly connected to our sound system, which typically work better than hearing aids. Those are still an option, but we now have acquired sound loops that can broadcast directly from our sound system to people's own hearing aids and/or cochlear implants, as long as the hearing aid/cochlear implant has telecoils. That sound should be even better.

Our bigger struggle has been a persistent hum during our livestreams and broadcasts. Just how bad it was depended on the week, but it sometimes made our services unwatchable. We now believe the source of the problem was our mixer, which we have replaced. The hum should be much reduced and maybe even eliminated. Please pray that it is!!

CREATION CARE KIDS' CORNER - by Mary Moore

JULY SIGHTS AND SOUNDS

July may make us conjure up thoughts of fireworks with their sparkling displays and thunderous booms. But there are plenty of sights and sounds in nature to look and listen for too.

Try to find or hear these:

butter and eggs - a flower that shows up along the roadside or dry, waste areas, starting around the second week in July. They get their name from the 2 different yellows of their petals: a pale yellow (butter) and a darker, orangish-yellow (egg yolks). The blossoms look like miniature snapdragons, and the stems and leaves are thin and delicate.

wild blueberries - usually smaller than the blueberries that you buy in the store or at a farm stand. What they lack in size, they make up for in taste. They are starting to get ripe around the middle of the month.

jewelweed - these plants love moist, shady places. The plant can be 2 or more feet tall; the flowers are cone shaped and are a light orange-yellow with speckles. Some people use the juice (sap) from the stem or crushed leaves to treat poison ivy. They also go by the name "touch-me-nots" because the small pods that hold the seeds burst open at the slightest touch, shooting the seeds a few feet away from the parent plant. These flower towards the end of July. Look for the seed pods later in August.

katydids - an insect so named because of the sound it makes, i.e. "Katy did" (or slight variations of that). You can hear them at night.

cicadas - mostly active during the day, these bugs get louder as the day progresses. Their sound can be described as whining or a high pitched hiss. You might want to check them out on YouTube. Both katydids and cicadas appear around the middle of the month.

gray treefrogs - these make a trilling noise. Cloudy days are the best time to try to hear them.

THE TRUTH ABOUT RECYCLING: Jim Shields

You've probably read or heard that recycling is dead or a joke, that only 5% of plastics get recycled, etc.; I know that I have. Here's the truth: plastics recycling in Mass. is alive and well. There are 9 Materials Recovery Facilities in Mass. where over 638,000 tons of plastic containers, paper, bottles, and cans go for sorting every year. Once the paper, cardboard, metals and plastic are sorted and separated from glass, they are compressed into 1000 pound bales and sold to companies to be made into new products and packaging. Plastics recyclers buy the baled plastics which they wash and grind into post-consumer resin, which they then sell to manufacturers that produce packaging, housewares, textiles, automotive, and agricultural products. The Springfield MRF was the first in the state to be built, in 1991, and has recently been retrofitted to improve its sorting efficiency.

In Mass., it is illegal to dispose of glass, metal, and plastic containers and paper in landfills. When non-recyclable items like plastic bags, diapers, electronics, garden hoses etc. are placed in the recycle bin, they must be hand-sorted out and placed in a "residue" pile. This adds to the sorting costs, damages sorting equipment, and poses risks to the workers.

According to a 2020 survey, 90% of recyclable plastic is reclaimed by North American recyclers. But about 40 million U.S. households don't have a recycling option, so that needs to improve. So don't believe the nay-sayers, and let's redouble our recycling efforts. Recycling is a vital part of our state's economy, and it saves resources, energy, and reduces greenhouse gases.

FROM THE KITCHEN

SPINACH – ARTICHOKE DIP

Ingredients

- □2 tablespoons olive oil
- □3 cloves garlic minced
- □2 cups baby spinach fresh
- □1 can artichoke hearts in water
- □1/2 teaspoon basil
- □salt & pepper
- □1 teaspoon <u>onion powder</u>
- □8 ounces cream cheese
- \Box 1/2 cup sour cream
- □3/4 cup grated parmesan cheese divided

Instructions

- Heat olive oil over medium heat in a large skillet. Add in garlic and spinach. Cook, stirring until spinach has completely wilted. Remove spinach and garlic and place on a cutting board to cool slightly.
- Drain artichoke hearts and chop into small pieces. Chop cooked spinach and garlic into small pieces. Add artichokes, spinach and garlic back to the hot pan and cook to remove any excess moisture, being careful not to burn the garlic. Sprinkle in basil, salt, pepper, and onion powder.
- Melt in cream cheese, sour cream, and 1/2 cup parmesan cheese into the veggies until fully melted and smooth. Transfer to oven-safe dish and top with remaining parmesan cheese.
- Broil until cheese has melted and dip is bubbly. Serve hot with chips, pita bread and/or veggies.

ZUCCHINI CASSEROLE

6 Tbsp butter 4 small or 3 medium zucchini 1/2 cup onion Cup carrots shredded 1 can cream of chicken soup 1 can evaporated milk 1/2 cup sour cream 1-1/2 cup Pepperidge farm herb stuffing

Quarter and slice zucchini. Shred carrots and chop onions. Sauté carrots and onions in butter. Add zucchini. Sauté for 15 minutes. Add soup, milk, sour cream and stuffing. Bake 1 / 2 hour at 350° F.
