TURNING THE PAGE TO PENTECOST (by Ted Zern)

As the liturgical calendar turns from Easter to Pentecost, a recent article that appeared in the on line giving platform we use, Tithely, caught my attention. It seemed especially fitting as Fr. Harvey noted in the latest Dovetale, describing Pentecost as the birthday of the Church.

While the author of the article is unnamed, it is dated March, 2023. It offers a glimpse into what the body of the church could look like and has its roots through the book of **Hebrews**. The book of **Hebrews** was written to the church but the last chapter in particular provides a seemingly straightforward description of exactly what a great church will look like. As you move through each of these 10 benchmarks that were cited in the Tithely article, consider how each may be applied to our very own St. David's.

1. Brotherly Love

"Let brotherly love continue" (13:1)

A healthy church will be a place of fondness, where fellow brother and sister believers experience the joys of relationship and fellowship.

2. Hospitality

"Don't forget to show hospitality, for by doing so some have welcomed angels as guests without knowing it" (13:2).

A healthy church will be hospitable. Think of your church as a "hospital." Hospitals don't turn people away, they don't demand money up front (although maybe your insurance card, but no card required in church!), and they don't judge anyone who comes in for help. They just provide it!

3. Remember fellow believers who are being persecuted or mistreated

"Remember those in prison, as though you yourselves were in prison with them, and the mistreated, as though you yourselves were suffering bodily" (13:3).

This refers specifically to those who are suffering for the cause of Christ. We should feel their pain, even as though we ourselves are suffering.

4. Be content in what you have

"Keep your life free from the love of money. Be satisfied with what you have, for he himself has said, 'I will never leave or abandon you" (13:5).

A healthy church will learn to be content with what God gives them. Don't be envious of the big church down the road, or the church that has more stuff. Praise God for what He has given them and do likewise with what He has given you. This applies to individual believers as well, as Christians should be content with that which God has blessed them.

5. Respect and submit to leaders

"Remember your leaders who have spoken God's word to you; Obey your leaders and submit to them, since they keep watch over your souls as those who will give an account, so that they can do this with joy and not with grief, for that would be unprofitable to you" (13:7, 17).

A healthy church respects both leaders who have gone before (vs. 7) and leaders who are currently serving (vs. 17). Pastors/teachers have an awesome responsibility to God for what they do, so follow them for their benefit (joy) and yours (avoiding the unprofitable).

6. Make Christ the center of all things

"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever" (13:8).

A healthy church remembers that Jesus never changes, so our main goals should never change. While some earthly things often morph into what becomes much different than what was, the core point of every ministry and activity should be telling the unchanging message of Christ. He is the Rock and the Foundation!

7. Seek to do good

"Don't neglect to do what is good and to share, for God is pleased with such sacrifices (13:16).

Healthy churches make an impact on their communities, investing in relationships, providing for physical and spiritual needs, and demonstrating the love of Christ in tangible ways, even when that comes at a cost.

8. Be steadfast in good doctrine

"Don't be led astray by various kinds of strange teachings..." (13:9).

A healthy church will never, ever stray from the basic message of salvation through Christ alone. The author of Hebrews reminds us that Jesus was that perfect Sacrifice that paid for the sins of man, once and for all. No matter what topics or passages we teach and preach, healthy churches always point people toward Christ.

9. Worship God Sacrificially

"Therefore, through him let us continually offer up to God a sacrifice of praise, that is, the fruit of lips that confess his name" (13:15).

A healthy church understands that worship is about much more than singing on Sunday morning. Yes, the fruit of our lips includes singing and praising, but we must also remember that every word from our mouth ought to demonstrate our complete devotion to the Savior. Every aspect of our lives should be spent in worship, or service, to God (see Romans 12:1)

10. Pray

"Pray for us, for we are convinced that we have a clear conscience, wanting to conduct ourselves honorably in everything. And I urge you all the more to pray that I may be restored to you very soon" (13:18-19)

A healthy church understands that prayer is essential. Here, we see prayers for spiritual needs (vs. 18) as well as personal and physical needs (vs. 19). At every level, healthy churches are filled with great people of prayer as they undergird the ministry of the church and the spiritual vitality of its members.

So, there you have it, a kind of measuring stick to gage whether the church, in particular St. David's, is living out the vision described in Hebrews. How do you think St. David's stacks up? The key to all of this is to understand that the church is not just a building, but a collection of people. The more we as individual church members put these things into practice, the more our church resembles what God prescribed. Remember also that healthy does not mean perfect. The journey is long and there will be bumps along the way, but let's not lose our compass.

SUMMER SCAVENGER HUNT

Here are some things to look for when you are outside this summer. Since you may not find everything in one day, why not keep track by writing down what you did see? Some examples of what you might see are in parentheses, but you might spot different ones. Enjoy! A bird with some red or orange feathers (robin)

A bird with some red or orange featners (robin) A bird with blue feathers (blue jay) A leaf that is dark red (Japanese maple) A flower on a tree or bush (rose) A fruit on a tree or bush (cherries) A mammal with 2 or more different colors of fur (cow) An insect that flies (butterfly, bee) An insect that lives in a colony (bee or ant) A worm A spider web

The first day of summer is called the summer solstice, and in the northern hemisphere it is usually on June 21st, but sometimes it is on the 20th or on the 22nd. Whichever date it falls on, it is the day when the sun is as far north in the sky as it will get in the northern hemisphere. Because the sun is so far north, we get the most hours of daylight around this time. Summer in the northern hemisphere officially ends in September at the Autumnal (or Fall) Equinox.

BE AWARE OF THE SUN:

Despite health warnings about sun damage, many of us still subject our skin to the sun's burning rays. More than a third of adults and nearly 70% of children admit they've gotten sunburned within the past year, according to the CDC. Years of getting too much sun can lead to early wrinkling and age spots, and it makes you more likely to get skin cancer.

USE SUNSCREEN

Cover any exposed areas of skin liberally with at least 1 ounce of broad-spectrum sunscreen. That means sunscreen that protects against UVA and UVB rays.

The sunscreen should have an SPF (sun protection factor) of at least 30. Follow these tips for applying sunscreen:

- Apply sunscreen about 30 minutes before you go outside.
- Use sunscreen even on overcast days, because UV rays can penetrate clouds.

• Reapply sunscreen every 2 hours – or more often if you're sweating heavily or swimming. If you wear makeup, apply sunscreen first and then put on your foundation. By itself, foundation doesn't have the broad-spectrum sunscreen that you need, even if it does have some sunscreen in it.
