THE LENT JOURNEY

This year the entire month of March falls within the Lenten season. We began this journey on Ash Wednesday (2/22) and will finish it on Easter Sunday (4/9).

Weirdly, Lent is one of my favorite seasons in the Christian year. That seems weird because it's a time for giving up small pleasures and/or taking on new responsibilities. Why would anyone enjoy that?

I can most easily explain why I love Lent by talking about food. Beginning around Thanksgiving, I eat and drink too much. It's fun, but I always gain six or seven pounds. By the end of Christmas, I feel bloated and heavy, but can't seem to reign myself in.

Then comes Lent, when I give up my main food vices. The first couple of weeks are a struggle, as I adjust my eating and drinking back to more sustainable levels. By the middle of Lent, I feel better physically, and my improved food habits don't seem burdensome. By the end of Lent, I usually have lost the weight I gained over the winter.

What is true in a measurable way for food/weight is true for my spiritual life more generally. Lent is a time to give up some of my bad habits and to take on a few good ones. Especially at the beginning, the changes can be challenging. But within a few weeks, I can tell the difference. I grow a little closer to God. I am a little more loving towards others. And once again, I appreciate the season of Lent for giving me the extra encouragement I need.

If your Lenten journey is well under way, I encourage you to stick with your disciplines and enjoy the benefits that come with them. If you haven't really gotten started, it's not too late to embark on a holy Lent. You won't regret it!

HOLY WEEK

Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday—April 2 this year. The entire week is a time for focusing on Christ, but the next big service is Maundy Thursday (April 6) at 5:00. (Note this is a new service time. Same for Good Friday's evening service.) Then Good Friday (April 7), which begins with a children's combination Stations of the Cross and Egg Hunt from 10:00 to 12:00. Next up is a traditional Good Friday Service at noon. At 4:30 we'll walk the Stations of the Cross. And our main Good Friday service will be that evening at 5:00. On Saturday (April 8), we'll join the good people at our Cathedral for an Easter Vigil at 6:00 (I think!). And of course, Holy Eucharist at 8:00 and 10:00 on Easter Sunday. I encourage everyone to take advantage of these opportunities as much as you can. And particularly on Easter morning, bring friends or family with you to worship!

LENT MADNESS

Based loosely on the NCAA basketball tournament, this online devotion pits saints against one another in a bracket as voters choose their favorites throughout the penitential season of Lent. Here's how to participate: on the weekdays of Lent, beginning on February 23, information is posted at www.lentmadness.org about two different saints. Each pairing remains open for 24 hours as participants read about and then vote to determine which saint moves on to the next round. If you're looking for a Lenten discipline that is fun, educational, occasionally goofy, and always joyful, join the Lent Madness journey. Lent needn't be all doom and gloom. After all, what could be more joyful than a season specifically set aside to get closer to Jesus Christ?

LENT PRAYER PARTNERS

Participants pray for their partner every day during Lent, and then send an Easter Card to their partner offering God's blessings on that person. This is a great way to support each other as a community of faith. If you would like to participate and are not already doing so, please let Fr. Harvey know.

LENT FORMATION PROGRAM

Our Lent formation program comes from the Invitation to the Observance of a Holy Lent (BCP, 265). The Church invites us to "self-examination and repentance;... prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and...reading and meditating on God's Holy Word." Each of our sessions will take up one part of that invitation. Clergy from area Churches will lead the conversations, but the plan is be practical, to talk about what people are doing or would like to be doing. Please join us Wednesdays at 6:00 on Zoom!

COMPLAINT-FREE LENT

This is another wonderful Lent option. The basic idea is to wear a purple bracelet that reminds us not to complain. Every time we do complain despite the reminder, we put aside a little money. At the end of Lent, we donate the collected money to a good cause. Those who have participated in past years will remember how helpful this practice can be. But I warn anyone who hasn't participated before: don't commit to putting aside much money for each complaint. It can really add up!! The purple bracelets are available throughout Lent (while supplies last). Please join the "fun"!

PRISON BIBLE STUDY, by Fr. Harvey

This ministry is different than anything I've experienced in the past. Because of obvious security concerns, the prison administration needs to clear all volunteers, and they don't really like ministries with lots of participants. But this is a team ministry involving more than a dozen people. Then there is the task of coordinating the volunteers, which can be its own challenge when we don't all have exactly the same vision of what we are doing. Still, I can say that the rewards far outweigh the challenges. We're two months in and, despite some awkward moments, it's off to a good start. I am grateful to Deacon Terry and Mary Moore for their leadership, and to Penny Miller who will soon be joining us. My hope is to figure out ways to involve people who may not want to enter the prison itself. There is one thing we can definitely all be doing: pray for the imprisoned women and for our efforts to help them. Thanks!!

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

CREATION CARE KIDS' CORNER, SPRINGTIME! by Mary Moore

Spring begins this month. All of nature seems to be waking up.

Some animals such as black bears are coming out of hibernation; robins and other birds are coming back while some birds that have been here all winter start to change color; flowers such as skunk cabbage are beginning to bloom.

Black bears - They may be pretty hungry after sleeping away part of the winter, and a snack they can't pass up is suet or the other foods found in bird feeders. If you have bird feeders in your yard and they are in easy reach for bears, you may want to take the feeders down until next winter. Bears have been known to tear down and break the feeders in order to get to the good stuff inside.

Birds - You should be seeing more robins than you did a month ago. In addition to other birds that are coming back into the area, red-winged blackbirds for example, some birds that have been here through the cold weather are beginning to change color in order to attract a mate. Male goldfinches wear drab colors during the winter, but have started to replace some of those feathers with bright yellow ones. They will stay yellow throughout the summer and a little bit into the fall.

Skunk cabbage -This is one of the first flowers to bloom, usually in late winter or early spring. You might be able to see some popping up through the snow if you take a walk in the woods, especially in wet areas like near a stream. These plants produce a lot of heat, and so some insects like to go into the flower blossom to get warm. Skunk cabbage gets its name from the skunk-like smell it gives off if its leaves are crushed or bruised. **Activity:** Make a list of any birds, mammals, or other animals that you haven't seen all winter, but see now. Do the same for any flowers that may be appearing.

CREATION CARE CORNER: Jim Shields

It was recently reported that the manufacture of "GREEN STEEL" is moving towards fruition as Boston Metal announced a \$120 million investment from the world's 2nd largest steel-maker. The funds will be used expand a pilot program in Woburn, Ma., and help launch commercial production in Brazil. The company uses renewable electricity to convert iron ore into steel. Steel production is a particularly dirty heavy industry, releasing more climate-warming CO2 than any other industry, accounting for 8% of worldwide emissions. Three quarters of the world's steel production currently uses coal furnaces that release pure iron from ore. Boston Metal's process runs electricity through the ore in a school-bus sized metal cell to separate the iron from the oxide. The liquid iron is then collected from the bottom of the cell. Boston Metal claims it can eliminate all CO2 from its steel production and hopes to raise production to millions of tons by 2026.

This new technology in steel-making holds great promise in the transition to cleaner processes that have less impact on the climate. Many European steelmakers are also announcing alternatives to traditional coal-fired steelmaking and some automakers are buying the cleaner steel to fulfill promises to customers and shareholders.
