THE START OF THE PROGRAM YEAR

The Church year and the school year don't exactly line up. There is no significant change of liturgical season in June or September. We enter the season of Pentecost a few weeks before school breaks for the summer. We're still in Pentecost now, as summer comes to an end and school begins again. If we just went by the liturgical calendar, nothing special would be happening this month.

But it is our practice, like most Churches, to follow the school calendar at least to the degree that we slow down a bit in the summer, and shift into what we have come to call the "program year" in early September. As a result, things pick up at Church this month.

For families, the big change will be the resumption of Sunday School on September 10. That day we'll also commission our worship leaders, and the Prayer Shawl Ministry will meet for the first time in a while. September is also "Creation Season," and we'll have a series of events connected to celebrating and caring for God's creation.

There are a pair of new formation opportunities. Starting in October, we'll have Confirmation classes for children and adults. Depending on interest, we may also watch and discuss episodes from the series "The Chosen" about Jesus and the disciples. All of that is in addition to our ongoing activities.

The point of all this is, I hope you'll get involved in whatever calls to your soul. And if something is calling you that we are not offering, please let me know. The Spirit is on the move. Our job is to figure out what the Spirit is doing and where, so that we can all get on board!

This year, the teachers have agreed to lead Sunday School for three weeks in a row in order to give the kids some continuity. The kids will be in Church the remaining Sunday(s) of the month. The helpers will rotate weekly as before, so each helper will work with each teacher.

CONFIRMATION CLASSES: by Fr. Harvey

To get ready, we are offering Confirmation Classes this Fall, probably on Sundays after the 10:00 service, beginning something like October 15. Folks who don't need to be confirmed or received but would like to learn more about their faith and our Church are also welcome!

Creation Season runs from September 1 through Saint Francis' Day (October 4), and plans are taking shape. On Sunday, September 17, we'll bless our grounds. On the 24th, we'll go on a Creation Walk. CREATION CARE CORNER: Submitted by Jim Shields.

The growing warmth and saltiness of the Gulf of Maine off New England is causing a dramatic decrease in production of phytoplankton, according to a NASA-funded group of scientists. Phytoplankton are the microscopic organisms that make up the base of the ocean's food chain. The study found that phytoplankton are about 65% less productive in the Gulf of Maine than they were 2 decades ago. The Gulf of Maine has become one of the fastest warming sections of the world's oceans. Phytoplankton are eaten by larger zooplankton, small fish and crustaceans. The loss of these tiny organisms has the ability to disrupt valuable fishing industries for species like lobsters, scallops, haddock, flounder, and pollock, and could further jeopardize imperiled animals like right whales and puffins. According to the lead scientist in the study, "the drop in productivity over these 20 years is profound. And that has large ramifications to what can grow here, the health of the ecosystem, the productivity of the ecosystem."

CREATION CARE KIDS' CORNER: Back to School by Mary Moore Whether you walk or ride to school, here are some things to look for when you are outside this month. Homeschooled kids can expand on this and make it a science lesson.

A lot of songbirds are migrating south. This is a good time to watch for birds that you don't usually see here because they have been spending their summer further north in Canada and are now just passing through on their way back south. An example is the whitecrowned sparrow. If you see an unusual sparrow that has black and white stripes on the top of its head, then congratulations; it is most likely one of these. (Springtime is another chance to look for out of the ordinary birds, as they head from the south to places north of here.)

Ladybugs might be gathering on your house trim as they try to find ways to get into the house for the winter.

Aster flowers - these provide needed food for bees, especially now that a lot of summer flowers have gone to seed or died. The flowers are typically about the size of a dime and they look somewhat like miniature white or light purple daisies.

You won't see as many bats as you might have during the summer. They are either migrating to caves in the area, or heading south.

The sun is rising later and setting earlier. It is also staring to get lower in the sky than it was compared to in June and July especially. (It will be at its lowest point in the sky about the third week of December.) Activity: Check and record the length of the shadow of a tall object such as an upright yardstick, or an adult, once a week, roughly in the same place and at the same time of day each time you measure. Midday is a good time to do this - you want to avoid doing this at sunrise or sunset, because these times will be changing. Keep at it at least until February if you can, even longer if you want to. Does the shadow's length stay the same, get longer, or get shorter? Why do you think this happens?


FLOWERS AND THE ALTAR CANDLE: by Fr. Harvey
