Jesus and the Apostle

As I write this, I have been back from sabbatical for just twenty-four hours, and I still feel a little out of touch. But I am ramping up and, looking ahead to September, I can see that a lot is happening. That activity is a beautiful indication of the health and vitality of our parish.

It is also an occasion to remember a bit of wisdom from Henri Nouwen's book *The Way of the Heart*. Nouwen writes, "the question that guides all organizing activity in a parish is not how to keep people busy, but how to keep them from being so busy that they can no longer hear the voice of God who speaks in silence" (69).

One of the benefits of a sabbatical is a slower pace of life than is normal for me during the ordinary course of parish ministry. Slowing down for a season creates a little extra time for connecting to our Lord. This came up for me most concretely during a session of spiritual direction with Bishop Scruton. We were talking about my Paul book, which was filling my time(!). Bishop Scruton said, "Of course, Paul's goal always was to point to Jesus." What a helpful reminder!! We can see from the Acts of the Apostles and also from Paul's own letters that he was often frantically busy. And yet Paul never lost sight of what mattered most. No matter what he was doing, Paul did it for God. That is the best lesson Paul can teach us. Everything we do can become a form of

prayer if we begin by asking God's blessing and end by giving God thanks.

Having been away for three months, I cannot express to you how pleased I am to be back with you, worshipping and studying and serving and eating and playing together. And I am thankful for the faithfulness of you all, who really do keep focused on Jesus the whole

time.

My prayer for us is that we can do all the things we are called to do. And that we can always keep focused on what matters most!

Flooring for the Church

Although we are not likely to be replacing the rug in the Church in the immediate future, beginning in October the vestry will be considering what direction we want to go. There are a variety of flooring options, and also carpet tiles. Each option has different strengths and limitations, so we are comparing apples and oranges. The different factors, as I see it, are: cost; durability; ease of cleaning; appearance; and acoustics. No doubt I have forgotten some. Car-Park Solar Project

The roller coaster continues. The state subsidies which were a crucial part of our project have been reduced. Resonant Energy is working with their construction people to try to find cost savings, and the State will release information about a new round of subsidies in September. But for the moment we are on hold. We will keep you informed as the coaster rolls on.

Building Update

The new air-conditioning unit for the narthex and the office side of the building has now been installed. In addition to being reliable—a significant improvement over the old system, which Bob Rendrick was heroically nursing along—it is much more efficient. I am told our electricity bill for July was roughly half what it was last year. That's good news for our budget, our planet, and our junior warden!

The Development Committee will be meeting on Friday, September 6th at 3:30 in the community room.

New Preschool Playgroup Starting By Virginia Ventulett

A small laid-back playgroup for caregivers and infants through pre-school will be starting up its program year on Wednesday, September 11th at 9:30 AM. The model for the group, which was formerly Grandparents' Playgroup, is based on The Red Round music facilitator training, and is a wonderful socialization opportunity for kids and their mom, dad, grandparent or caregiver. The first half-hour is free-play; the second, large muscle movement play; and the last half-hour is devoted to what can be only very loosely called "music making" with preschool instruments and noisemakers, rhythm sticks, singing and dancing.

The group meets Wednesday mornings from 9:30 to 11, following the Agawam School calendar (and snowdays), at the nursery in St. David's Episcopal Church, 699 Springfield Street, Feeding Hills (adjacent to the Police Station). Young Scholars Program by Fr. Harvey

This program offers college scholarships to elementary school students. You read that right—elementary students. The idea is that at-risk children benefit from early interventions. The children come from the MLK Charter School and the White Street School, both in Springfield. The schools nominate promising children. The Young Scholars Program promises money if/when the children actually go to college. In the meantime, the schools and the program combine to offer enrichment and support.



If you would like to join this effort, please talk to me. I have served on the Board of the Program for the last few years, and I strongly recommend their work. You can also check them out online at www.youngscholarsfund.org. The Program can always use money, but the single greatest need is for "scholar mentors." Each mentor tracks one or more students. At a minimum, that means getting their report card each summer. For people with more time, mentors are invited to school events and field trips. I have not been able to do much of that myself, but it is the most rewarding part of the work since it means getting to know the children and their families.

FALL SUNDAY SCHOOL

CISA Farm Share Update by Jim Shields.

I am very pleased to say that we raised \$418.50 for the CISA Senior FarmShare program, which will provide 3.3 shares. Our contribution will help provide 10 weeks of local farm share produce for low income seniors throughout the Valley. CISA partners with senior centers and community centers for distribution. Thank you so much to those of you who were able to contribute to this program.

CREATION SEASON

Our Diocese is participating in Creation Season from September 1 until October 6 (when we will celebrate St Francis!). At Saint David's, we are planning thee special events. On September 15, at 11:30, Father Harvey will lead a conversation on "Hope for Creation: A Biblical Perspective." On September 29, also at 11:30, Mary Moore and Jim Shields will lead a Q&A about the science of climate change and/or the Sustain Our Island Home Carbon Tracker. CARBON TRACKER UPDATE by Jim Shields

Since I last reported in the July DoveTale, there are no additional St. David's members who have created a profile on the Sustainislandhome.org web site. So we stay stuck at an aggregate of 8700 points, 34 actions taken, \$780 saved, 7 members enrolled, and 4th out of 5 Episcopal churches enrolled in the program. I again urge you to reflect on the importance of Creation Care from a Christian perspective, and to take action. It takes just a few minutes each day, and over the course of a month, you pray by name for every nation in the world, and every member and ministry here at Saint David's. Give it a try. We can all use more prayers on our behalf!!!!

Reading the New Testament

We continue to work our way through the New Testament this year. The reading is quite manageable—we read just one chapter each weekday. To encourage broad participation, we include the specific chapters for each week in the bulletin and our weekly e-mails, as well as a link to helpful introductory videos for each book. It's not too late to join the effort!! Just start where we are now. You can go back over the books we have already read later if you like. We gather for conversation about what we are reading about every four months—our next gathering will be in early October.

Praying at Home

Versions of both Morning Prayer and Compline appropriate to this season (Pentecost) are available in the narthex, along with a schedule of readings. Pentecost lasts until Advent, which begins on December 1. If you have never prayed any of the Daily Office, consider giving it a try. It's a wonderful way to add a little time for prayer and engagement with Scripture! And it is not a big time commitment. Depending on how you say it, Morning Prayer takes about 15 minutes, and Compline is under five.

Making Sense of Paul by Father Harvey

This is a three-part series about the Apostle Paul based on my work this summer. The sessions will be Wednesday evenings, October 9, 16, and 23, at 7:00 in the Saint Andrew's Room at Saint Andrew's Episcopal Church in Longmeadow. The sessions can stand alone or function together as a sries. All are welcome.

10/9 Becoming the Apostle to the Gentiles

As the Christian movement began to take shape, Paul emerged as its harshest critic and persecutor. Then he had a dramatic, mystical encounter with the resurrected Christ, which changed everything. In this session, we will talk about the Christian movement Paul joined, his transformation from opponent to advocate, and the battles he fought within the Church itself over the validity of his gospel.

10/16 Kingdom Living

In this session, we will examine Paul's teaching about the kingdom of God. In Paul's view, Christians of his generation were living in an entirely unprecedented time. He claimed (1) that Christ's death and resurrection had defeated sin and death, and also (2) that Christ would return, perhaps in the near future, to finish the job by establishing God's kingdom in power and glory. We will look at Paul's answer to the question, what did it mean to live as Christians in between Christ's victory and Christ's return?

10/23 Christian Freedom and Christian Love

The two great characteristics of Christian life, in Paul's view, were freedom and love. In this session, we will see just how strongly Paul emphasized Christian freedom, but also how he qualified it by insisting on Christian love and unity. We will conclude the session by seeing how his views on freedom and love shaped his comments about women's religious leadership, and discussing how we might make sense of those comments today.
